HELD AS HOSTAGES AND EXECUTED WHEN GERMAN TROOPS ATTACKED CITY BERLIN May 2—Via Copenhagen—Among the hostages said to have been shot in Munich by the communists before they were overpowered were Princess Albert of Thurn and Taxis Prince Von Trede, privy councillor at Berlin and Prof. Frank Von Suck.

Havard News Agency Cable. BERLIN May 3—Desperate fighting between Government forces and Communists is proceeding north and east of Munich according to advices received here. Already more than 100 persons are reported to have been killed.

The Red guards before evacuating Munich destroyed all documents at police headquarters wiping out the records of 50 years.

## AT THE CHURCHES

### ZION CHURCH

Personal or individual Evangelism was the keynote of the pastor, Rev. J. P. Haunh, yesterday morning, for the new conference year.

Opportunities are upon us on every hand, and Christ's command to-day still is the same to his followers as it was to his disciples of the early church, "Follow Me." He must still be our supreme pattern and example in all our personal efforts and aims for the Kingdom.

Rev. A. Clemens, of Didsbury, Alberta, preached at the evening services, in a very acceptable manner on crown of the Christian. Our unselfish service to Christ is to be such, that in the end it will earn a crown of victory. Meanwhile, in the eyes of man, we may merit a crown of derision or thorns, as did our Master, but ultimately it will result in a crown of victory and glory.

To daily merit our crown, we must be willing to pay the price of sacrifice, surrender, unceasing service and toil.

At the 8 o'clock mass meeting in the Bible School building, Mr. Taylor Statten gave a very illuminating and helpful address as to his experiences and observations while overseas in Belgium, France and Germany, in connection with Y.M.C.A. work in the seat of war. His descriptions of the areas of devastation, of army huts and their work, of the life of the citizens in the larger cities of Belgium and Germany, were graphic, and intensely interesting. The same line of work followed out in the war period by the Y.M.C.A. is to be followed out in our Canada in peacetime, for the safety of boys and young men.

## Second Week of Special Services

### At St. Mary's Church By Redemptionist Fathers.

The first week of the Renewal Mission services at St. Mary's Church was concluded yesterday. The first week as is known was for the women members of the congregation. All the services were well attended. This week there will be services for the benefit of the men.

The services are being conducted by reverend fathers of the Redemptionist Order, Toronto, namely Rev. Father Sholly assisted by Rev. Father Sturm and Rev. McDiarmid.

At the evening service yesterday Rev. Father Sholly delivered an inspiring address to the attendants. During the course of his message he pointed out that the signs of the times indicated there is considerable ungodliness in the world today, and warned against the apparent spirit of Bolshevism. He stated that it was necessary that one open his or her heart to God. This would be the only solution to social, political and international problems. The special services will continue until the end of the present week.

Divine service was attended by members of Grand Union Lodge No. 97 I.O.O.F. in a body on Sunday evening at Trinity Methodist Church. Many brothers were present for the occasion.

The members assembled at the lodge quarters and shortly before seven o'clock marched in a body to the edifice. After the services they returned in the formal dispersal followed.

An appropriate message to the brothers and to the congregation was delivered by Rev. H. J. Mc Bain the minister of Trinity Church. He besides referring to the ideals for which Oddfellowship stood, including friendship love and truth, made a reference to the centennial of the Order, which is being observed in Ontario by the raising of a \$250,000 fund for the Home in Toronto. He alluded to the worthiness of the cause and to the wisdom of assisting the local efforts which are being made for the fund.

## Rumanians Capture Hungarian Capital

Army of King Ferdinand Reported to Have Captured Hungarian Capital.

REPORTS TO PARIS SAY PETROGRAD PROBABLY CAPTURED BY THE FINNS.

LONDON, May 3.—The Rumanian army is reported to have occupied Budapest, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Berlin.

Hungarians Lax. COPENHAGEN, May 3.—The Rumanians yesterday effected a crossing of the Theiss River at Szolnok and Tisza-Polgar, according to advices from Budapest. Miskolcz, 90 miles north-east of Budapest, has been evacuated. Czech forces have advanced near Benneve, the main cause of this military success being due to lack of discipline on the part of great numbers of Hungarian troops.

Refuse Concessions. GENEVA, May 3.—The Rumanians and Czech-Slovak Government, according to reports received here, have refused to entertain the offer of Bela Kun, the Hungarian foreign minister, to accept territorial concessions providing that fighting stopped on all fronts.

Fearful Occupation. BUDAPEST, Friday, May 2.—Any hour, may see a change in the ministry from Soviet to Social-Democratic in order to save the city from occupation by the advancing Czechs, Rumanians and Serbo-French troops directed, it is stated, by Gen. Berthelot.

The city is quiet, but there is a feeling of panic lest the Reds engage in massacres of the bourgeoisie before the allies reach the city, and entire families are fleeing.

The last train for Austria, which now is the only frontier open, left Wednesday afternoon, crowded to the utmost with men, women and children, standing in all the cars and reached Karmorn at 7 o'clock. Immediately after the departure of the train Czechs crossed the Danube and cut off the possibility of any more trains leaving.

Another Report. VIENNA, May 3.—It is stated in all-hood circles that the commanders of the Czech, Serbian and Rumanian troops have decided not to occupy Budapest, confining their operations merely to an encirclement of the Hungarian capital.
