MARKET REPORTS

CHICAGO, April 30.—Liquidating sales to make ready for May deliveries tomorrow, cut a great deal of figure in lowering the price of wheat. Heaviness characterized the close, which was 2-4 to 1-1-1/2c under last night's level. Other leading staples, 1000 standard loaves, corn 1-8 to 3-8c net, oats 1-4 to 7-8c, and provisions 5 to 12 1-2c.
Free buying of the part of a big warehouse interest tended somewhat to offset in the corn market the bearish effect of the decline in wheat. On the other hand, rapid progress in planting was an element adverse to the bulk. Efforts to change from the May option to later months resulted in pulling down the oats market as a whole. Good cash demand, however, helped to check the downturn.

Cash demand was indifferent. Oats were slow, demand being only for a few cars. Total inspections Thursday, 228 cars, as against 164 cars last year, and in sight 165 cars.
Wheat futures closed 5/8c to 1c lower, cash 5/8c to 1c lower, 5/8c to 3/4c lower, and flax 3/4c higher.
