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WANDERERS AND OTTAWA PLAY TONIGHT

Deciding Game of E. C. H. L. at Ottawa Will Send Stanley Cup to Ottawa If Home Team Wins.

The big game of the Eastern Canada Hockey League season will take place to-night in Ottawa when the Wanderers and Ottawas meet in what promises to be one of the greatest contests played on Canadian ice. If Ottawas can beat the Wanderers to-night, the Stanley cup goes from Montreal back to Ottawa, where it was held for some years. Should the Wanderers accomplish the great feat of defeating the Ottawas on their home ice the two teams must meet again in a series of games to decide the championship and the possession of the Stanley Cup, for the Stanley cup goes with the championship of the E. C. H. L. Russell Bowie and Joe Power will probably be the referees.

The Wanderer team is unknown, but Riley Heme will be in goal for sure and probably Art Rose and Walter Small will be the other two defence men. That will leave Jimmie Gardner, Ernie Johnson, Steve Vair and Pud Glass and Joe Hall for selection for the forward line, with Dunlop, who at one time played with the Moncton Victorias, figuring as one of the spare men.

Fred Taylor Badly Hurt.

Up in Ottawa there is some doubt about Fred Taylor, the star defence man, being able to play as the result of an injury sustained in Saturday's game with the Montreal Shamrocks at Ottawa.

An Ottawa dispatch tells of Taylor's injury as follows:

"The first bad accident sustained by a member of the Ottawa hockey team came in the first half of the Shamrock-Ottawa game here Saturday. Fred Taylor received a skate wound in the right foot that will probably put him out of the game for the rest of the season. The accident, while a bad one, is not so serious to the victim as it may possibly be the team's chances of winning the championship. With Wanderers playing here Wednesday in what should prove the deciding game of the E. C. H. L. series, Taylor's mishap is most ill-timed. He has proved himself the most useful man a team could have and practically does the work of two people."

The accident took place shortly after Taylor had electrified the crowd by a run the length of the ice, winding up with a score. He tore in on one of his celebrated dashes but lost the puck, Laviolette, the Shamrock defence man, knocking it behind the net, where the two raced to retrieve it. Taylor fell down and received the full benefit of either his own or Laviolette's skate on the right foot between the ankle and heel, cutting a rugged gash three inches long right through to the bone. The inexplicable part of the affair is how it actually happened. Those close by saw the wound was inflicted by Taylor's own skate, while Taylor himself declares it came from Laviolette's."

Garry Herrmann Sold At Advance of \$125

Hon. John Morrissey Bought Thoroughbred Stallion Yesterday For \$450 From Messrs McKnight & Forbes--Horse Will go to Northumberland County This Week--Was a Famous Racer as a Two Year Old.

Hon. John Morrissey, of Newcastle, yesterday afternoon closed for the purchase of the thoroughbred stallion Garry Herrmann, one of the recent importations by the provincial government from Kentucky, which was bought at the sale by Messrs. James McKnight, of this city, and Charles Forbes of Nashua. The price paid was \$450, or \$125 more than the animal brought at public auction at St. John, and he will be shipped to the Miramichi this week and will eventually be quartered, it is likely, at the farm of Mr. George E. Fisher.

"Yes," said Hon. Mr. Morrissey last evening at the Barker House, "I purchased Garry Herrmann this afternoon and he will go over North this week. I bought him because I think Northumberland ought to have one of the thoroughbred stallions to improve the general purpose horse stock of the county."

Garry Herrmann is a brown horse foaled in 1898 and stands 16 hands 2 1/4 inches. He is by imported Escher and his dam was Silk Gown by Longfellow, and he has two strains of Messenger blood both through American Eclipse, and a great many strains of Donnan. Garry Herrmann ran twenty-five races as a two-year-old, winning eighteen and being placed in six of the other seven.

He was an immense colt for his age, standing over 16 hands high, and before he had finished his twenty-fifth race he was lame. He was started once as a three-year-old, winning at a mile and a sixteenth, and ran one losing race; he was then permanently retired and has never been fit for racing since. In every other way he is a magnificent individual, and

DR. LEWIS HERE.

Veterinary Surgeon Has Been on the North Shore for Some Time and Says Horses There are All Suffering From the Horse All.

Dr. T. L. Lewis, V.S., the former Fredericton man who resided at Somerville, Mass., for many years, is at the Barker House, having returned yesterday from North Shore, where he has been for the past few weeks.

The doctor has opened stables in Newcastle and Chatham and has been kept busy, there being an epidemic of horse all of a bad variety among the horses on the North Shore during the past few weeks.
