IVES, Hon. WILLIAM BULLOJK, Q.C., P.C. (Sherbrooke).

S. of Eli Ives and Artemissa Bullock, of English extraction. Ancestors first settled in Connecticut; moved to the Co. of Stanstead among the first settlers on the Lake Memphremagog. B. in the Township of Compton, Co. Compton, 17 Nov., 1841. Selfeducated, after taking course in Compton Academy. M., 17 Nov., 1869, at Cookshire, Co. of Compton, Elizabeth E., only dau. of the late Hon. J. H. Pope, M.P., Minister of Railways. Called to the Bar, P.Q., 1867. Apptd. Q.C., 11 October, 1880. Having become largely interested in manufacturing, he ceased the active practice of law, in 1890. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Presdt. of the Council, 6 Dec., 1892; became Minister of Trade and Commerce, 21 Dec., 1894. Was a mem. of the Thompson, Bowell and Tupper Administrations, and resigned with his Leader, 8 July, 1896. Sat for Richmond and Wolfe in the Commons from g. e., 1878, to g. e., 1891, when he was returned present seat. Re-elected by acclamation on acceptance of Office, and again at g. e., 1896. John de Lotbinière, Hon. Sir Henry Gustave, Q.C., K.C.M.G. (Portneuf).

S. of the late Gaspard Pierre Gustave Joly, Esq., Seigneur de Lotbiniere, by Julia Christin, dau. of the late Hon. M. E. G. A. Chartier de Lotbiniere, Speaker of the Quebec Assem. from 1794, until May, 1797, and afterwards a mem. of the L. C. of same Province. B. in France, 5 Dec., 1829. Ed. at Paris. M. the dau. of Hammond Gowan, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar L. C., March, 1855. Apptd a Q. C., 9 March, 1878. Declined a seat in the Dominion Cabinet as Minister of Agriculture, Jan., 1877. On the dismissal of the DeBoucherville Administration by Lieut.-Governor Letellier de St. Just, in March, 1978, became Premier and Commr. of Public Works. His Ministry resigned 30 Oct., 1879.
