

Both he and his wife have proved themselves to be possessed of the true missionary instinct. For a number of years he was one of the teaching staff of Indore College. He has been greatly blessed in his work, being characterized by one of his fellow-workers as "one of our best missionaries in India." He and his family have enjoyed excellent health in that trying climate. He was home on furlough with his family in 1903, returning again to India in the following year.

The Rev. James Skene B.A., son of the late George Skene, was born on the homestead, near Dornoch, and, like the other young men from Latona Church who made the ministry their choice, was in early life engaged in farming. After a course in Owen Sound Collegiate Institute he entered University College, Toronto, and after graduation he began the study of Theology in Knox College, graduating in 1895. He was shortly after called to his first charge in Hillsdale, County Simcoe. After a successful pastorate here of nine years he was called to his present charge in Baltimore and Coldsprings. Mr. Skene is a vigorous preacher and a faithful pastor, and is maintaining the high level of ministerial efficiency set by the sons of Latona who entered the ministry before him.

The Rev. Robert Bradford Ledingham, B.A., Latona's latest recruit to the ministry, is the son of the late William Ledingham. Before commencing to study for the ministry he was engaged for a time in teaching school. He took his Arts and Theology in Manitoba College, except the final year, which he took in Knox College, Toronto, graduating in 1905. Before graduating he had large experience in the mission fields of Manitoba and the North-West. After a short pastorate in the Presbytery of Orangeville he was called to Sperling, Manitoba, where he now labors. This is one of the fields he had served as a student, and it was the success of his work then that led to the call.
