church, has written a hook on the life and work of Dr. MacKay, entitled, "The Black Bearded Barbarian," the name by which he was first known to the natives of Formosa. Not far from London was the early home of Dr. MacKay, Zorra, which has given so many scholars and theologians of note to Canada.

Dr. Falconer, a Maritime Province man, and father of the President of Toronto University, neld the Moderatorship in 1916, when the Thirty-second Assembly met in the First Presbyterian Church. There were lively sessions over which he was obliged to preside, owing to that aggressive infant, church union, which was claiming attention.

Argument waxed hot on both sides on the floor of the house, until it was commented by onloolers that "those who were for it were just as pugnacious as those who were against it." The grand old blue traditions of the church were freely and heatedly quoted by eloquent speakers. The retiring Moderator this year, Dr. John Neil, of Westminster Church, Toronto, has for many years held an outstanding position in Presbyterianism in the Dominion of Canada.
