





GERMAN LEAVE

The Landing Excitement and the A

LUNEVILLE, France, Apr. 3.—German Air Cruiser Zeppelin, after refilling, ascended and departed for Germany shortly before 6 o'clock this afternoon.

The landing of the German Zeppelin airship Zeppelin IV., which had a sensation by descending on a parade ground here in the night, was satisfactorily explained by the French board of inquiry to-day. The airship and her crew were released on payment of \$20,000 custom duty and the incident declared by the authorities as a success.

The crew of the dirigible kept virtually prisoners through the night, but technically not in custody.

The officers and mechanical board numbered eleven and they all requested to remain in Lunéville until the incident had been investigated, to which they agreed.

The aviators asked if they be allowed to sleep in the cabin of the airship which is about the dimensions of the pullman car. The French commandant consented to this and they passed the night surrounded by fifty French soldiers, posted as sentinels to the merely curious from approach.

General Auguste E. Hirsch, chief of the aviation corps of the French army, arrived from Paris the night to take charge of the investigation, which began at 10 o'clock this morning.

Opinion in military circles is divided as to whether the Germans really lost their way or undertaken an audacious attempt at espionage.

STILL MAKING THINGS

Railways Are Alarmed What Suffragettes Do In Old Land

(Canadian Press Dispatch)
LONDON, April 4.—Two suspected of being militant suffragettes, arrested at dawn this morning, tried to escape from the police by dropping bags they were carrying away.

The bags were found to contain paraffin, paper saturated with dyes, matches, cotton wool, paper lighters, etc. In each of the bags a paper bearing the serial number of how you treat Mrs. Pankhurst.

The girls were brought up before police court, where they gave names as Phyllis Brady and M. Dean. They were remanded in charge of being suspected.

They had explained to the police who arrested them that they were turning from their Easter holiday to the suffragette cause.

Railways Alarmed.
LONDON, April 4.—The railway systems of the United Kingdom to-day are alarmed that militant suffragettes had opened to burn stations in various parts of the country. Patrols were to be organized at all stations and the tunnels.

Some empty trains were damaged by explosives near port Cheshire, in the course of the night, and suffragettes are suspected of having committed the outrage.

Explosives Found.
A canister of explosives had been placed under a seat in one of the cars with a quantity of fire saturated with resin and oil, and force of the explosion splintered the carriage.
