## Paris News

(From our own Correspondent.)  
 PARIS, May 9.—Two records were broken when the board of education met last night. They started sharp on time and there was a full attendance of members as follows: Chairman Inkster, Secretary Dr. Logie, and Messrs Whitty, Haire, O'Neil, Barker, Dunton, Teller, Hilborn, Miller, Munn and Martin.

The following communications were read: Mr. Cassidy wrote that the Separate School Board appointed Mr. Bell as their representative on the board of examiners at the entrance examinations.  
 Mr. H. D. Broughton stated that if the board would grant him an order for \$20 for expenses he would see that the overflow pipe on Dundas street adjoining the school and his property would be properly repaired. On motion of Messrs Whitty and Haire it was referred to the buildings and grounds committee.

The caretaker of the Central school requested a new lawn mower and grass shears and the grounds committee was authorized to purchase the same.  
 Principal Dickson submitted his monthly report showing a total of 517 pupils on the public school roll with an average attendance during April of 445, or 84 per cent. During the month deposits in the penny bank amounted to \$91.61.

A large batch of small accounts, amounting in all to \$332.50 were ordered to be paid. They included among other things, 1-2 bu. of corn for seed purposes at \$5 per bushel.

The town's bill for water for the quarter was \$14.60 compared with an average of \$8 to \$9, and it was thought there must surely be some mistake and the bill was referred back.

Principal Dickson requested the board to buy six volumes of new practical reference library for \$22.55, but as this amount would starve the school library the motion to purchase was lost.

The board then adjourned.

## A Boost

Given Grand River  
 District By Boston  
 Paper.

The following is from the Daily Christian Science Monitor published in Boston, U. S. A.  
 Judging from the returns already made by the industries of the Grand River district of Ontario, those who are disposed to compare the region with New England will not be so very far from the mark if they shall continue to do so for a few years more. Within its borders are embraced the busy manufacturing towns of Brantford, Berlin, Galt, Paris, Preston, Waterloo and Dunville. In these places the value of manufactures in 1909 was shown by the census to be \$14,546,312 and by the census of 1910 to be \$39,349,312, surely a remarkable gain in a decade. The district of course, is not nearly so populous nor so productive as any of the leading industrial centres of New England, but in the character and variety of their manufactures the Grand River towns might well compare with those of the Merrimack river towns in Massachusetts without calling for too great a stretch of the imagination. For instance, they have knitting and underwear factories, they run out rubber goods, agricultural implements, furniture, railroad cars, all kinds of machinery and small wares. Some of the plants are only in their infancy; some are well developed; every year seems to swell the volume of their output.

Reference to the district at this time is especially opportune, because if Canada is to be affected favorably by contemplated changes in the American tariff, the Grand River towns will be among the earliest to feel the change. Whether, as predicted, two generations more will see the banks of the Grand River lined by hundreds of thousands of artisans, it is impossible at this time to say, but it is a reasonable prediction that under normal conditions the industries now being established will keep pace with the growth of the Dominion. The most enthusiastic of Canadians, everything considered, could hardly ask for more than this.

 ST. JOHN, N. B. May 9.—A. P. Hazen of Montreal, manager of the Bank of British North America here, died early to-day.

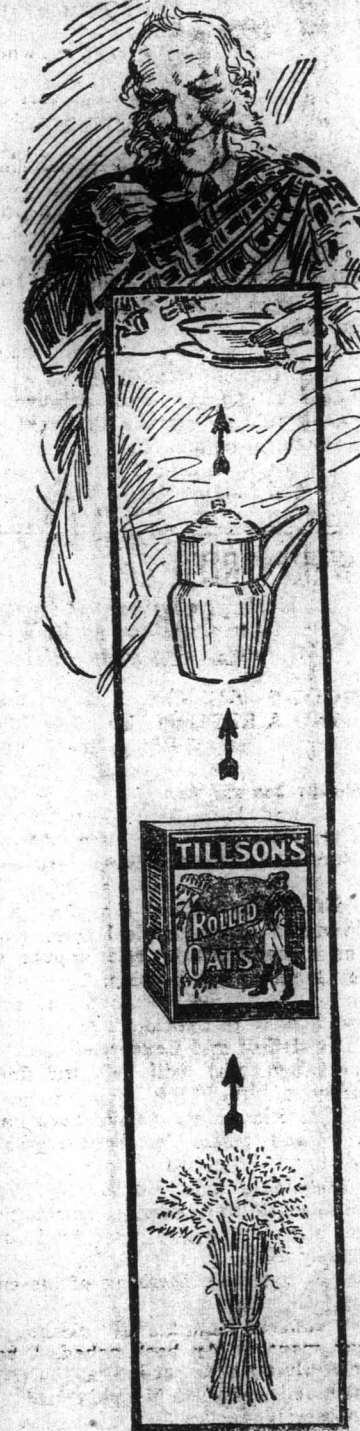
Balloon is Missing.
