## ROBBERY IN THE CITY EARLY THIS MORNING

### Gold Watch Taken From Mr. W. H. Turnbull's Residence, 27 Park Avenue—Marauder Escaped.

About one o'clock this morning the home of Mr. W. H. Turnbull, 27 Park Avenue, was entered by an unknown burglar and a gold watch and the property of Mr. Charles W. Turnbull, a son were stolen from the owners bedroom. Although the police believe the burglar to have been an amateur, he displayed some knowledge of the game, further than that he is believed to have had a knowledge of the premises.

Before attempting to gain an entrance he went to a workhouse on the premises, where he secured a saw, hammer and other tools. He then entered the house by a cellar window, but he did not find it necessary to raise the trap, as the window had simply to be pushed open.

Once in the cellar, he removed his overcoat and shoes, leaving them in the cellar, he proceeded to investigate, first visiting the furnace room. Evidently he was well supplied with matches, as he left a complete trail of the lower rooms in the house were visited and although there was evidence that he had investigated nothing was taken. The room occupied by Mr. Charles W. Turnbull was the only one visited on the second floor and it was evident that he made straight for the room.

Entering the room, the burglar commenced his work, but he did not carry on operations quietly enough. Mr. Turnbull was disturbed, but believing that it was morning and that his father was getting up, he paid little attention. The burglar in looking for plunder rattled some fancy pins lying on the dresser and this brought Mr. Turnbull to a realization that something was wrong. Switching on the lights he saw the man, who was thick set, about 5 feet 6 inches in height, about 26 years of age and wore a light colored suit and cap. Before departure the burglar secured the watch which was on a table near the head of the bed and the ring which was on the dresser. Mr. Turnbull pursued him until the sidewalk was reached, the burglar and pursuer jumping a high board fence en route. It is evident that preparation was made for a hasty departure as the dining room door was left open.

The police were called on the phone, but were advised that it was useless to come down. Detective Chapman visited the house this morning and is investigating the case. The coat and shoes are worth about \$15.00.

## UNEMPLOYED IN RAID ON THE CITY HALL

### Over 158 Applicants For Work Up to This Afternoon at 3 o'clock

The expressed intention of the civic authorities to provide work for the unemployed, has caused a stir around City Engineer Jones' Office.

During yesterday and up to about 2 o'clock this afternoon 158 applications were made for work, 61 of which were made yesterday. Of the total making application there were 20 Canadians, 1 Armenian, 7 Foreigners, and the balance English, Irish and Scotch and Welsh people. As will be noted by the figures the majority of the applications were made today. One clerk was kept busy almost the entire morning. Such particulars as to length of residence, when last employed and where, nationality, the number dependent upon the applicant for support, were made note of. Previous employment with the city is not being taken into consideration, it being somewhat largely a case of first come, first served. The worthiness of the case has been and will be considered.

With such a large number of applications it is a problem to know just how best to benefit as many as possible. Work was started this morning on a sanitary sewer on Brock street between Grey and Marlborough streets. Twenty-five applicants were given employment this morning and when the work has progressed a little, forty more will be employed. Eight hours will be worked each day, which at 20c an hour yields a revenue of \$1.60 per day. Those applying this morning were told to come back on Thursday, it being the intention to give the work in shifts of one week's duration.

City Overseer Howie has a staff of eight men clearing away willows on City property at the foot of South Market street.

He had a proviso that if she should marry the money was to go to the children. Dr. Parent and Mrs. Wood were married and the woman died last year. The estate is said to amount to about \$16,000.

### FIRST BAPTIST SUND SCHOOL

#### Annual Meeting Last Night—Glowing Reports on Work of the Past Year.

The 80th annual meeting of the Teachers and Officers of the First Baptist Bible School, was held last evening in the auditorium of the Y. M. C. A. During the first part of the evening the teachers, officers and orchestra were given a banquet by the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent, after which business was transacted.

The Superintendent, Mr. Chalcraft, occupied the chair and called for the following reports.

The Cradle Roll was read by the superintendent of this department, Mrs. D. L. Wright. Fifty names are enrolled on the Cradle Roll; some 70 visits were made to the families whose little ones are numbered on the roll.

The Superintendent's report was presented by Mr. F. Chalcraft, who spoke of the efficiency of the school and outlined several needed improvements: the most important of which was the enlarging and renovating of the Primary Department. No definite action was taken but the matter will be laid before the church at the annual meeting when the church will be asked to place this department of the school in an up-to-date condition.

The Librarians' Report was read by Cecil Perry, Assistant Librarian showing that there were about 300 volumes in the library and that on an average thirty books were taken out every Sunday.

The Secretary-Treasurer's report was read by Mr. Geo. A. Winter and showed an enrollment of 518. Total attendance from the year was 17,300 or an average of 335. Highest attendance was rally day 500; the lowest was 156. Number of papers distributed 21,050, or an average of 405. Number of scholars baptised and united with the church during the year 18. The total receipts for the year were \$899.68, of which amount \$492.83 was taken in collection during the year, the balance being given by friends of the school towards the renovating of the school room. \$150 was given to missions and about \$325.00 towards the repair fund of the church. Average collection per Sunday \$9.44.

Much praise was given to all connected with the school for their help during the year. Votes of thanks were tendered to the officers and the orchestra, and to the hosts of the evening.

The credit and honor of the position as a school and for the attendance and efficiency, was given to the pastor, Rev. Llewellyn Brown, who loves the scholars and who is greatly loved by all.
