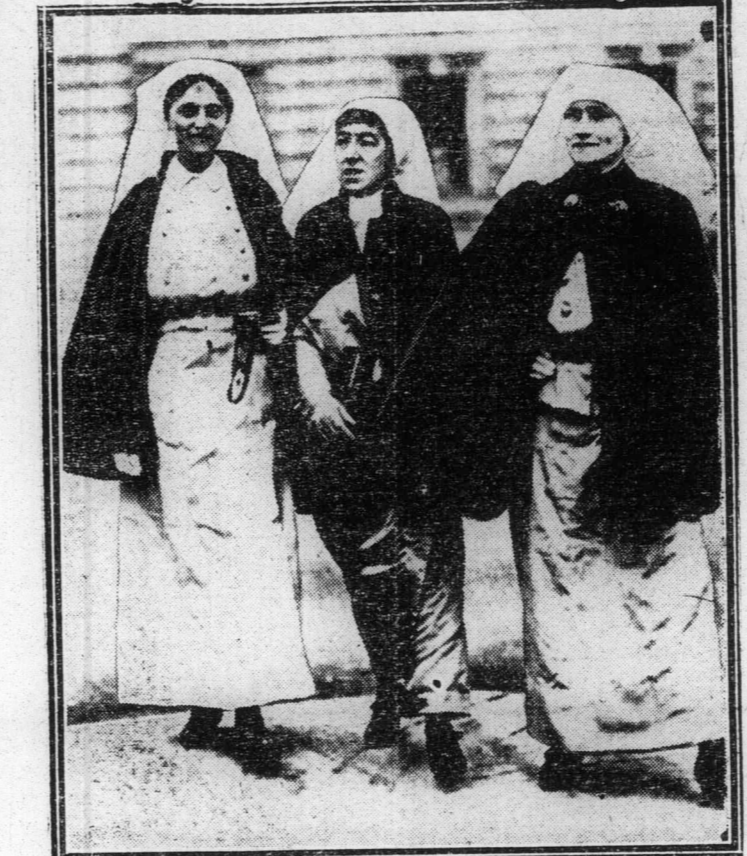

A GERMAN VIEW OF THE SOMME

Every Advance Leaves the Allies Worse Than Before, They Think.

Berlin, Aug. 10.—(By wireless to Sayville).—"Correspondents on the western front describe the battle of the Somme as the most gigantic which ever has taken place," says the Overseas News Agency. "The initial successes won by the Entente allies were due to the fact that they attacked with forces ten times as great as the number of troops defending the positions. But after German reserves and heavy artillery were brought up the advance of the enemy was checked.

"Since July 29 he has continued his efforts in vain, throwing fresh troops into the fight. The correspondents agree that this is a mad and useless sacrifice.

"Tactical differences between the attacks at Verdun and on the Somme front are evident. Every German success won at Verdun shortens the line in addition to extending the amount of conquered territory around the fortress. The French were thus compelled to make violent counter-attacks, which caused them heavy losses. On the Somme the small advances of the enemy have lengthened the attacking front. The advanced hostile detachments are shelled by the Germans from two and sometimes three sides. The correspondents are of the opinion that the Somme region was chosen for the attack because the railroad of Amiens is behind the Franco-British front and also because the French and British lines join there."

AEROPLANES FLEW ABOUT KING OF MONTENEGRO

Paris, Aug. 10.—A squadilla of German aeroplanes flew over the headquarters of Colonel—on the French front while the King of Montenegro was there paying a recent visit. The hostile machines drew a hot fire from the numerous special cannon and the French artillery. The king, with glasses, followed the evolutions of the war planes, firing at them with satisfaction the telling shots that put them to flight.

King Nicholas had previously pinned the Montenegro military medal on General Gouraud, who was formerly commander of the French expeditionary force at the Dardanelles. He visited the headquarters of the Russian brigade and decorated other French and Russian officers and men, and then reviewed the troops.

After the review a crowd of children surrounded the king and General Gouraud. Suddenly stopping his automobile, King Nicholas turned round to them, and in a vibrant voice called out: "Children! Raise your hands and swear that when your turn comes you will be brave and loyal soldiers like the heroes you have just seen pass by."

"Long live the king of Montenegro," shouted the children as the automobile made its way through the crowd.

CZAR'S French

CLEARING THE RETREATING AU
ARE WINNING

Action on the Low
to a Close and
Prisoners is Gro
With Extraor
valry and Cyclis
Blaze of Search

Rome, via Paris, Aug. 11.—The number of prisoners taken by the Italians since the fall of Gorizia exceeds 15,000, according to the respondent of The Tribuna on the Isonzo front. Italian cavalry and retreating Austrians, and according to the correspondent, the battle continues in favor of the Italians on both wings.

Rome, Aug. 11, via Paris.—The latest reports show that the Isonzo action is drawing to a close in its first stage, with the number of Austrian prisoners still growing. The number of men killed or wounded in the battle is large. Neither side has yet been able to make an accurate estimate of the casualties, though total for both sides will probably reach 60,000.

From evidence arriving here belief prevails that the victory of the Austrians, as the result of the fighting was the severest yet seen on the front. The Austrians contested every inch of ground, and even after the loss of the strategic points of Monte Sabotino and Monte San Michele.

While the success of the Italians doubtfully was due largely to the heavy artillery, which matched last year's year of waiting for the Austrians, the heavy 305 mm. Austro-Austrian guns, yet the hand-holding was appalling in its numbers. bayonets, knives, bombs, and alrly swords, pistols, an arms, every description being used.

Deeds of heroism were plentiful, especially in connection with the use by the Italians of a method for destroying barbed entanglements involving the almost certain death of the soldier who plants the bomb for this purpose.

The victory of the Italians is considered all the more creditable, in that the Austrians on the lower Isonzo front had long prepared for an attack on a large scale, having successfully resisted many previous ones on sections. The taking of Monte Sabotino, the key to Gorizia and the vast area surrounding it, is regarded as the biggest feat in all the fighting in the Isonzo region. While the Austrians previously had taken and lost San Michele many times they before were able to approach it.

The Fight for San Michele
The Austrians fought for possession of San Michele to the very counter-attacking hourly. The fense and capture of the bridge the Isonzo connecting Podgora Gorizia was the outstanding feat of the last twenty hours of fighting before King led the first cavalry cyclists into the city. The Austrians were unable to hold the bridge.
