

pears of a good cooking kind, and simmer in water till three-parts Drain off half the water cooked. add 2 tablespoonfuls of sugar and cook for 5 minutes longer. Boil for 6 minutes half a cupful of rice, draw off water, and finish cooking with milk and sugar till firm and smooth; add a little cream, a small piece of butter, some powdered sugar and the juice of half an orange. Mix all well ogether and dress on a dish with the pears.

Baked Pears

Wipe, quarter and core pears. Put in baking dish, sprinkle with sugar, or add a small quantity of molasses, then add enough water that pears will not burn. Cover, and cook two or three hours in a very slow oven Serve with cream

Sweet Pickled Pears Pears, 7 lbs.; sugar, 4 lbs.; vine ar, 1 quart; whole cloves, 1 table poon; whole all spice, 1 tablespoon




