BULGARS RETREAT UNDER SERB FIRE

Withdraw from Stronghold on Kaimakalan Mountains.

Sofia, Oct. 2, via London, Oct. 3.—A retreat by the Bulgarians under heavy Serbian artillery fire is reported in an official statement, issued by the War Office, referring to the Macedonian front. The statement says: "In the Lake Prespa region there was considerable artillery activity which was not infrequently directed south of Kaimakalan. As a consequence of violent artillery fire on the summit and in order to avoid unnecessary loss our troops were ordered to withdraw to their main position in the Moglenia valley."

GERMAN FORCE ARE GREATLY WEAKENED AND DEMORALIZED

Have No Reserves Available Now all Being in the Field, While First Class Troops are Scarce—Shortage of Men on Both Front Necessitates Frequent Shifting of Troops

By Courier Leased Wire. New York, Oct. 3.—A New York Times cable from London this morning says: "The German army, which is now with the French armies, sends a despatch analyzing Germany's manpower. He says: 'Of the 1913 infantry division composing the present German army, 117 consists of only three regiments of three battalions each instead of four regiments of three battalions. The proof that the Germans have now no strategic reserves is shown by the manner in which divisions are moved from one battlefield to another without rest or reorganization.'"

CANADIANS' BIG RECORD

Continues to Mount Up in the Important Somme Fighting.

DISORDERS IN GREECE CONTINUE

Reservists and Other Factions Continue Demand for War.

London, Oct. 3.—(New York Times Cable)—The correspondent of the Daily Chronicle at Athens, sends the following under date of October 1st: "The anarchistic leagues of reservists continue to disturb public order in various parts of Greece. Late last night, after an enthusiastic reception had been accorded to M. Guillemin, the French minister at one of the theatres, reservists gathered and paraded the street shouting their usual cries. Two pickets on the spot did little or nothing by way of restoring order. One man who shouted 'long live Venizelos' was very severely treated."

More Local Casualties

The names of two Brant County men appear as wounded in the official casualty list this morning. Pte. F. Greenwood of Brantford and Pte. F. C. Harris of Burford. Pte. Greenwood was one of the first men to leave the city upon the outbreak of the war, enlisting in the Dufferin Rifles and departing on August 23 with the quota from that regiment, which at Valcartier camp became attached to the 4th battalion. At the time of his enlistment, Private Greenwood was employed as a carpenter, and resided at 77 Marlboro street. He was an Englishman, and served for four years in the 7th Manchester regiment. This is the first time that his name has appeared on the casualty lists, though he has been at the front for over eighteen months.

BRIDGES DESTROYED

Berlin, Oct. 3, via London.—The War Office announced to-day that Austrian and German monitors had destroyed the pontoon bridges across the Danube in the rear of the Roumanian forces which have crossed the River an invaded Bulgaria.

Somme Fighting is Continued

By Courier Leased Wire. Paris, Oct. 3, 12.30 p.m.—Violent fighting has been in progress on the Somme front north of Bancourt, the war office announced to-day. The French curtain of fire and machine guns, however, were effective in checking German attempts to debouch from the St. Pierre Vaast wood in this region.

More Reverses for Bulgars Upon Macedonian Front

Serbs Make Further Advances Taking Enemy Trenches, While British Also Repulse Attacks.

Paris, Oct. 3, 12.30 p.m.—The Serbians fighting in the Kaimakalan region, on the Macedonian front, have made further progress, according to to-day's War Office announcement, taking first line trenches from the Bulgarians and capturing another battery. Bulgarian attacks on British positions on the left bank of the Struma were repulsed, the Bulgarians sustaining heavy losses. The statement follows: "On the left bank of the Struma, two fresh Bulgarian counter-attacks against the positions captured by the British on September 30, were repulsed with sanguinary losses for the enemy. "In the region of the Cerna the Serbians continued to advance on western slopes and the main crest of Kaimakalan. Serbian infantry yesterday carried first line enemy trenches. "In the left there was the usual cannonading. Bad weather continues."

Roumania Troops Invade Bulgaria

By Courier Leased Wire. Sofia, Oct. 3, via London, Oct. 3.—The number of Roumanians who have invaded Bulgaria is placed at several battalions by the Bulgarian war office. A statement announcing the passage of the Danube by the invaders says: "On the Danube near Lianoo between Rustchuk and Turtukal the enemy conveyed to our banks in boats several battalions. Measures have been taken to attack this force."

A NOTE-WORTHY DEED

Achieved by a Canadian Corporal. He Accounted for No Fewer Than Twenty-Three Men.

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—In the course of his report of the severe fighting from September 20th to 27th the Canadian Eyewitness relates a wonderful feat accomplished by an unnamed Corporal of an eastern Ontario battalion. It says: "In the course of all this desperate fighting there have been innumerable instances of the most courageous and devoted actions, impossible at present to detail. The case of a Corporal of an eastern Ontario battalion is, however, one of the most extraordinary ever recorded. The battalion had successfully captured a line of German trenches, when a party of twenty men, consisting of two officers and about twenty men, began a counter-attack. The Corporal advanced alone against the whole party, emptied his revolver, picked up first one and then another German rifle, each of which he emptied, accounting for the two officers and sixteen of the men. While he was shooting one of the officers attacked him with a bayonet and pierced him in the leg below the knee, but the Corporal shot him dead. The rest of the enemy attempted to escape. The Corporal shot four of them, and made the fifth a prisoner. Although wounded in two places, he remained in the trenches until his battalion was relieved."

GOUNARIS FORMS PRO-WAR PARTY

Ex-Premier of Greece Favors Her Intervention on Side of Allies.

Paris, Oct. 3.—A new political party favoring intervention in the war on the side of the allies is being formed in Greece by Demetrios Gounaris, former premier, according to an Athens despatch to the Havas Agency. The despatch says that the movement is meeting with a favorable reception. Despatches from Peloponnese report widespread demonstrations there against the anti-Venizelist movement. Demetrios Gounaris headed a Greek cabinet which was formed in March, 1915. He was defeated by the Venizelists in the following June and the cabinet resigned two months later. Gounaris subsequently served as minister of the interior in the Skoulioudis cabinet, and the fall of that administration was said to be largely due to the opposition of the Entente to Gounaris, who has generally been credited with unfriendly feelings toward the allies.

EVERYBODY'S DOING IT

Japanese Premier and His Cabinet Decide to Resign.

The premier is said to have stated that he would recommend to the emperor the appointment of Viscount Takaaki Kato as his successor. EVACUATE FORTS ON THE DANUBE

Von Mackensen Withdraws to Avoid Being Surrounded.

London, Oct. 3.—Field Marshal Von Mackensen, who commands the forces of the Central allies operating against the Roumanians and Russians in the Province of Dobruja, has ordered the evacuation of the Danube fortresses of Dobruja, says Bulgarian and Turkish forces, a despatch from Rome to the Wireless Press. The reason given for the withdrawal of Von Mackensen's forces is that the German commander is in danger of being enveloped by the Russian and Roumanian troops which have crossed the Danube between Rustchuk and Turtukal.



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xi ICE age le BYNOTIS OF CANADIAN HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W.
