Against a Thirteen-Year-Old South Grimsby Girl.

TERRIBLE CHARGE

IS SHE GUILTY OF MURDER?

Her Charge—She Denies the Accu-ation, but Offers a Weak Now Under Arrest

ST. CATHARINES. Feb. 25.—South Grimsby has a real live sensation in the shape of an alleged murder case, the alleged murderer being a 13-year-old girl namep Lulu Lacey, who lived with the family of Mr. Pierson, of South Grimsby. The girl was brought to the jail here about 11 o'clock Saturday night by Constable Clarke and will have to stand her trial for the alleged crime.

The victim is an 18 month old child of Mr. Pierson. Lulu Lacey was employed at the Pierson home to do light housework and mind the baby. Saturday Mrs. Pierson went to the barn to do the milking and left the baby and Lulu alone. When she returned to the house the baby was found to be suffering greatly and a doctor was at once sent for. The child, however, shortly afterwards died from the effects of supposed poisoning and suspiona at once rested upon the hired girl and she was placed under arrest.

It seems that there was a bottle of medicine in the house, which was procured by

cine in the house, which was procured by one of the brochers of the dead baby for some illness. The medicine contained strychnine, not sufficient to kill a baby. strychnine, not sufficient to kill a baby. The girl, on being questioned, stated that the baby asked her for the bottle and she would not give it to him. The baby then by some means secured possession of the bottle and emptied a portion of its contents into his mouth. This story was not believed by the parents and Lulu was arrested on a charge of murder. She was taken before Magistrate Forbes and remanded for a week, when the circumstances connected with the case will be fully investigated.

Fromptily at three o'clock he walked into the assembly room of the Parliament buildings in Queen's park and found the Speaker's chair vacant. On account of that intentional and customary oversight he walked out again and waited around until a Speaker was chosen. This is the usual custom. W. D. Balfour was then by vote of the members authorized to attach "Hon." to his name and take the chair. When the Lieutenant-Governor was informed of the fact he returned and delivered the

Two Convicts and Twenty-Three Mule Smothered in an Alabama Mine. Smothered in an Alabama Mine.

Birmingham, Ala., Feb. 25.—Two convicts and twenty-three mules were smothered to death early yesterday morning in Rock Slope shaft No. 1 at Pratt mines.

Shortly after two o'clock the engine room in the slope was discovered on fire and a general alarm was given on the outside. LONDON, Feb. 25.—The Daily Chronicle's Vienna correspondent says: Prof. Wagner, of Vienna University, expounded a cure for insanity to the medical society. He injected Koch's tuberculine, causing a fever, after which the insanity diminished. He repeated the treatment a few times.

Died to Free His Wife,
Sr. JOSEPH. Mo., Feb. 23.—B. J. Milhouse, a stock raiser living near here, had his wife arrested on a charge of bigamy. Yesterday he committed suicide, leaving a letter in which he declared that he took his own life in order that his wife might be free to live with the man whom she had married in violation of the law.

Panis, Feb. 25.—At the Cabinet meeting M. Gadaud, Minister of Agriculture, made an order-in-council forbidding the importation of American cattle into France on account of the fever and pleuro-pneumonia with which they are alleged to be infacted.
