PLENTY OF COAL

Stocks of Anthracite in Canada Up to Average.

No Excuse for Rushing the Price up if Dealers are Reasonable—The Situation Outlined.

Buffalo, Sept. 27.—A prominent coal dealer here, who is in close business touch with Canada, and who makes frequent trips to the coal mines in Pennsylvania, states that the stocks of anthracite in Canada are most satisfactory to the dealers there, as they are carrying the usual quantity held this time of the year. He says that while there is a scarcity of hard coal on this side of the line, it will not influence prices in Canada, unless the dealers there have no conscience and exact strike prices from the consumers. Furthermore, he asserts that there is no basis for a radical advance in prices of coal in Canada for some time, as most dealers have supplies to carry them past the probable duration of the strike.

Of the condition of the strike he gives it as his opinion that the trouble will soon be settled by arbitration. He states that Archbishop Lynch, who has widespread influence in the affected district, is doing his utmost to arrange for arbitration, and that the operators and miners are now partly persuaded by the Archbishop to commence negotiations with that object in view.

DEAD ISSUE NOW.

Home Rule Cuts No Figure in the British Campaign This Year.

Some Well Known Candidate Who Disapprove the War.

London, Sept. 28.—A curious feature, comparing the present election with those bitter campaigns of 1892 and 1895, is the absence of home rule from the hustings. Except in Ireland it is a dead issue. Lord Rosebery's attitude is an endless source of expectation. So far the ex-premier has given no sign that he will take an active public part in the elections, but his friends are working hard on his behalf, and many candidates favor his leadership. An interesting candidature is that of J. B. Salford, Liberal candidate for North Salford, who took the leading part in the formation of the English sewing cotton company, and who threw himself into American three companies' amalgamation. Captain Hedworth Lampton, who with his sailors, marines and naval guns did so much to save Lady Smith, seems no longer a sporting candidate for Newcastle-on-Tyne, is trying to put his disapproval in a practical form. Another severe critic of the war is T. A. Brassey, candidate for the Christ Church division of Hampshire, whose African services in connection with the Imperial Yeomanry are, politically speaking, a somewhat convenient thorn in the side of the government.

Charles Rose, the owner of the well-known yacht, Distant Shore, often mentioned as a possible challenger for the America's cup, is the Liberal candidate for the Newmarket division. Not only has he a son at the front, but he mourns the loss of two who have fallen in South Africa.

MISTAKE PROVED FATAL.

Portland Man Drank From a Glass Which Contained Conite.

Portland, Me., September 28.—Almeron Newman went into Gibb's drug store last evening and picked up a graduate which had contained conite, taking a drink of water from the same. He got the glass behind the prescription case. He died in two hours. No blame attaches to the druggists. Newman once lived in Detroit, and is a brother of Isaac N. Newman, of Brown's pharmacy.

This he opened, without saying a word, and laid on Gambetta's desk before attempting to speak him or to explain the purpose of his call. TO HIS OWN DEATH

Friendly Viceroy of Shanghai has Been Ordered

By the Chinese Government Which Is Fully Controlled by the Boxers.

New York, Sept. 28.—A despatch to the Herald from Shanghai says: The situation in China is now more serious than ever before for those who are interested in preserving the integrity of the empire. The Chinese government is in the power of boxer leaders, who are not likely to submit to the emperor's propositions unfavorable to them. The friendly viceroy of the south are still loyal to the throne and any foreign aggressions in southern China will precipitate an armed uprising.

Already the governor of Nanchang province has addressed a memorial to the emperor, declaring that his signature to the viceroy's agreement with the foreign consuls in Shanghai was forged. There is danger that the friendly viceroy will be replaced. Sheng, the friendly viceroy of Shanghai, has been ordered north, and that practically means his death. Russia is holding all the forts and strategic points from Taku to Peking. Russia's possession of the railway shows by the permanent arrangements which her officers are making that she intends to swallow the north of China. No one believes that Russia will ever move out except under overwhelming pressure from other powers.

Germany's assurance that she does not desire territory in China if the latter be able to pay an indemnity is misleading. Her demand for a condition precedent to peace negotiations means continued war and perhaps the complete disruption of the Chinese government.

Friendly feeling between Russia and Japan is increasing. France is hand in glove with Russia.

Vice-Admiral Seymour's attempt to undertake the isolated British occupation of Shanghai and to patrol the Yang Tse Kiang has weakened the British position, while losing an opportunity to take a definite agreement for non-partition of the empire with Japan. The United States is consistent, but powerless.

La Hui Chun Liu, who is undoubtedly the new viceroy of Canton, is anti-foreign. Unless the allies protest, the friendly viceroy is likely to have no friends left in China.

The only method for dealing with the situation not involving disposition of Chinese territory is through the friendly viceroy, gradually removing the throne from the power of the boxer leaders.

NOW IT IS MOLKANS

From Southern Russia Who are Coming to the Northwest.

Montreal, Sept. 28.—Three Molkan delegates from southern Russia have arrived from Ottawa. The purpose of the visit is to make arrangements for the transportation next winter of 7,000 of their compatriots who intend to leave southern Russia to settle in the Canadian Northwest. The Molkans are spoken of as a highly desirable class of settlers, industrious and frugal, and with knowledge of farming and rudimentary handicrafts. They hold peculiar religious tenets, and their views are obnoxious to the ruling authorities in Russia. They do not object to military service, but have long suffered under Russian oppression.

AN OPEN QUESTION.

Too Much Study Demanded at Home From Leaving Boys and Girls.

It is an open question with many thoughtful people whether there is not a screw loose in the system which demands and exacts so much study at home from growing boys and girls. At precisely the period when the physical life is most important in its claims, when the lad is shooting up like a weed, when the girl is all legs and arms, and both are in the greatest need of play, of rest, of exercise, they must spend five or six hours of daylight in school, stimulated to intellectual activity at every point. It is little wonder if they are correspondingly listless and languid when the hours of recitation are over, and not altogether ready to give any portion of the afternoon to the preparation of the next day's studies.

I fear the expectant attitude of American parents in general reinforces that school boards and trustees, since few fathers and mothers have patience with a dull child, or sufficient common sense not to be cruelly mortified if their sons and daughters do not make rapid progress.

The doctor interferes now and then, lays an arresting hand on the home work, cuts short the hours of school attendance, or gives a cessation of school for a while, but the doctor is obeyed under protest. Most of us would be deeply humiliated if our children were not regularly promoted every half year, or if our neighbor's children took prizes and not ours.

In the main time, if we sit down to render what assistance in the evening's labor may be within our power, we find our cheeks mantling with the blush of shame. We still can spell, but it is extremely doubtful whether we can pronounce, both Latin and English having suffered a change since our day. Our attention is bestowed elsewhere—on bread-winning, if we are fathers; on sewing, mending, visiting and housekeeping, if we are mothers. Yet we expect many a son, since here is an obligation which we cannot shirk.

The probable reason for the situation is that we attempt too much in primary, grammar and preparatory schools. In the first few years of a life's effort, should we be to train a child so that he or she may know how to pay close attention, how to learn. A very few subjects thoroughly mastered are of more value than many merely glanced at and superficially discerned. —Hewer's Bazar.

GEMS

The native music of aboriginal tribes is regarded as of great importance in anthropology, and the recent British expedition to the Torres Straits and New Guinea have taken steps to preserve some of them. Some of the songs heard on Murray Island are already obsolete, and will, it is believed, die out with the old men of the tribes. "In savage life," says one of the members of the expedition, "the songs of a tribe are its chief heritage."

Birmingham, England, is the only place in which manufacturing crowns is an industry that may be said to flourish. The trade is principally with Africa, where the numerous kings have come to regard a crown as a far more elegant emblem of royalty than the stoneware hat which they formerly affected. A servicable crown, gaudily decorated with imitation precious stones, may be purchased for quite a small sum.

The Japanese apply one of their many pretty ways to the launching of ships. They use no wine but hang over the ship's prow a large pasteboard cage full of birds. The moment the ship is afloat a man pulls a string, when the cage opens, and the birds fly away, making the launch with music and the whirl of wings. The idea is that the birds thus welcome the ship as she begins her career as a thing of life.

The monster telescope at the Paris Exposition which will, it is said, bring the moon within thirty-six miles, is three times the length of the largest of its predecessors, the Yerkes telescope at Chicago. It is 197 feet long, 5 feet in diameter and weighs twenty-one tons. The lenses, the largest in existence, measure over 49 inches in diameter and weigh 1,320 pounds.

The English people think that the proposed new nine-penny coin will enable them to get the better of the French, who, it is assumed, will accept the coin as the equivalent of a franc. At present, when John Bull visits Paris, he frequently has to surrender a shilling in exchange for an article the value of which is a franc.

Lord Methuen, at his own expense, has erected a monument over the grave of Count de Villebois Mareuil, bearing the following inscription: "To the Memory of Count de Villebois Mareuil, Colonel of the Foreign Legion of France and General of the Transvaal, who died on the field of honor, near Boshof April. R. I. P."
