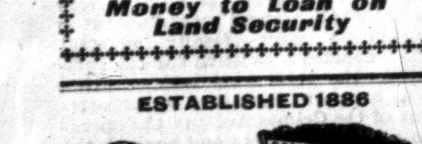

Stella Peck, the 4-year-old daughter of Herbert A. Peck, of Detroit, Tuesday afternoon fell into a pail of boiling water, and after suffering terrible agony for 15 hours, died at five o'clock this morning.

Tuesday morning an alarm of fire was sounded at Kingsville, a blaze having been discovered in a small stable adjoining Gilkinson's livery. It contained three horses, a new harness, valued at \$1,100, which was destroyed. Cause of fire unknown.

The Brooklyn Eagle of Monday last gave a column report of the services of the St. Thomas evangelists, from which the following is an extract: "Crossley and Hunter, the Canadian pastor evangelists, began their second tour of services in the Simpson Methodist Episcopal church, corner Clermont and Wiloughby avenues, and spoke to large audiences. The evening services were the most largely attended since they began their work one week ago. The church was filled with an eager, attentive assembly that listened to the earnest convincing words of the evangelists and during the progress of the evening service many gave expression to a desire to begin the Christian life."

SAVED FROM DEATH.
Niagara Falls, Jan. 15. — Fred Truesdale, of this city, while out duck hunting on Niagara River, got caught in an ice flow and had a miraculous escape from being swept over the falls. Truesdale tried hard to get free and reach open water, but his efforts were of no avail and he drifted rapidly toward the American falls. William Holman, another old river man, seeing a rope hurled to Willow Island, close to where Truesdale was drifting. When the boat was about forty feet out from shore, Holman threw the rope, which fell across the river, and Truesdale quickly tied it about his waist, and, leaving the boat he was dragged, half dead, across the ice and through the water to the island. As he landed he fell unconscious in the arms of his rescuer. Within a few minutes Truesdale's boat and gun passed over the bridge of the American falls.

"TELELECTROSCOPE."
Indianapolis, Jan. 15. — An Indianapolis inventor, who at this time refuses to have his identity divulged, through the affidavit by his attorney, says he will soon give to the world an invention that will revolutionize one of the great branches of the country's industry. The device is called the "teleelectroscope," whereby a man using a telephone may see and be seen, as well as talk, hear and be heard.

The teleelectroscope, it is said, has been tried and tested and its operation is successful. It remains only to add an improvement or two before the mechanism will be in shape to be put on the market.

Attached to the sending device of the telephone, rising above the dial, will be a small mirror-like reflector. The talker, by gazing into this, will see pictured before him not only the person talking at the other end of the wire, but also the objects surrounding the talker. Pictures on the walls, chairs, tables, and, in fact, all the furnishings in focus, will be accurately reproduced in the picturing mirror. At the same time a dialer attached would enable the second party to see a clearly and distinctly as the first party.

GERMAN OFFICER ARRESTED.
Paris, Jan. 15. — A Nice despatch to the Journal says a serious case of espionage has been discovered at that place. A German nobleman, in the service of the Prussian army, who was concerned in the affair, has been arrested.

THEIR LIQUOR ACT POLICY.
Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 15. — The Government party had a caucus last night and discussed the Liquor Act policy. Your correspondent learned that on the 15th the municipal lists and sixty-two and a half per cent. of the vote polled will be required.

A mammoth prohibition deputation will visit on the Government to-morrow to oppose the referendum and urge the enforcement of the act.

A SPANISH RIOT.
San Sebastian, Spain, Jan. 15. — The decision of the municipal authorities to suppress the annual popular holiday consisting of tormenting bulls, occasioned serious rioting to-day, during which many persons were injured, and much property was sacrificed. A mob stoned the town hall, the residences of the municipal officers and the barracks of the gendarmes, and swept through the streets, undaunted by the shots of the gendarmes. The latter were powerless until a force of troops arrived and charged the rioters. Many arrests were made.

IN SPITE OF SCANDAL.
Vienna, Jan. 15. — Herr Wolf, the Pan-German leader, whose colleagues in the Reichsrath recently insisted on his resignation on account of a social scandal, was re-elected to the Reichsrath to-day at a bye-election held at the Rautenau, Bohemia.

BABIES POISONED.
Cologne, Jan. 15. — The Cologne Gazette says the police have arrested a woman who is suspected of having poisoned over 50 babies who were in her charge. The public prosecutor is in possession of a mass of evidence against the woman. He is now trying to discover if she had any accomplices.

PEERAGE FOR HARCOURT.
London, Jan. 15. — It is reported to-day that the coronation honors will include the offer of a peerage to Sir William Harcourt, formerly Liberal leader in the House of Commons. Sir William is married to Elizabeth, daughter of the late Hon. J. L. Motley, the historian. The statement is revived that the King will offer a dukedom to the Marquis of Salisbury, the Premier will possibly not accept, as it is understood that he does not desire an alternation in the ancient title which he inherited, and which he values for its historic associations. It is expected that Earl Cadogan, the present Viceroy of Ireland, and that a similar advance in the peerage will be offered to Lord Spencer, former Liberal Viceroy of Ireland, and First Lord of the Admiralty in Lord Rosebery's Administration.
