THE BALLOON ASCENSION.

A large crowd of sports and others gathered at the Fair Grounds Monday afternoon to see the ball game between Windsor and the locals, and incidentally to see Tommy Burns hand out the decisions. H. S. Clements, M. P., gave a short address and introduced Mr. Thomas Burns, of pugilistic repute to the audience.

The game was unusually slow throughout, and bright plays were few and far between. The Windsor team was too much for the local boys and won by a score of seven to two. The visiting team put up a fairly good brand of amateurish ball. Dumond in the box and Betz behind the bat made an excellent combination as batter for Windsor. Dumond had three strike-outs and allowed three men to walk. His support was good. Fluet at right field was successful in rounding the diamond two times. Paine got a hit and two runs. Neil got two hits and one run, and a two-base hit, and Linnie scored a run. The performance of the Windsor boys was creditable all through and very few errors were chalked up against them.

The home team certainly had a day off, as there was not a player who did not have a bad mark or two against him, and some of them had several errors. Davis was not up to his usual standard and allowed the Border people to connect freely. He had six strike-outs, and allowed six men to get bases on balls. His support was discouraging and one dismal round of errors from beginning to end. Brundage and Peck appeared to be vying with each other as to who could make the longest and most disreputable list of bad plays, and did stunts in the error line heretofore unknown in baseball annals. Depew, Pleasence and Bunting were the players who deserve credit for keeping the score down as low as it was.

Pleasence did clever work in the field. He was responsible for a nice double play, catching a fly and pushing it to first, putting the runner out.

This was the brightest play in the game and to which the only cheers of the day were given. He also scored a run. West scored the second run for the home team, both runs being scored in succession in the sixth innings. The other players were taking it easy and making errors.

The game was umpired by Tommy Burns, the champion heavyweight pugilist of the world. His decisions were satisfactory to every one concerned and were fair throughout.
