The Ontario Railway and Municipal

The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, provided for under an act passed at the last session of the Legislature, is composed of Mr. James Leitch, K.C., of Cornwall, chairman; Mr. Andrew Ingram, of St. Thomas, M.P. for East Eigin, and Mr. H. N. Kittson, of Hamilton. The Secretary is Mr. Henry C. Small, barrister, of Carleton Place. The salary of the Chairman is \$6,000 per annum, of the other two members \$4,000, and of the Secretary \$2,000. The members hold office during the pleasure of the Government and must give their whole time to the work. They cannot directly or indirectly hold railway stock or have any interest in any device or article, etc., used by railways, of any stock in utilities subject to the

directors of any public utility or of any
company that has power to invest any
portion of its funds in the securities of
