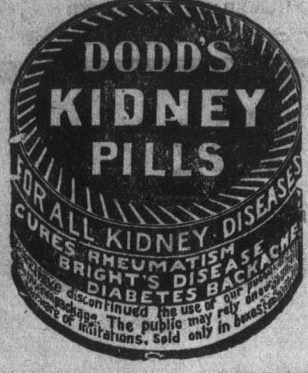




KING A VICTIM OF ECONOMY.

Berlin Decides That Receptions to Royalty Are Too Expensive.

Berlin, Dec. 11.—When King Haakon arrives in Berlin next Saturday he will not be received at the Brandenburg gate by the municipality, nor will there be any elaborate official welcome by the city, as has been the custom whenever a foreign monarch has visited the capital.

The city fathers have decided that these receptions are far too costly.

According to an official report, Berlin in the decade from 1895 to 1905, spent no less than 1,000,000 marks in entertaining royalties, and the bills for the past six years has aggregated 300,000 marks.

Murder First; Then Fire.

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—George Ladouceur, a lemming, is in the cells charged with drunkenness, but the charge of murder may be laid against him. Mrs. Emma Blanchette, who had a police record, and who did not live with her husband, but with the prisoner, was found after a fire in the tenement, on the floor dead. Her hair was badly singed and she had two large cuts over her eyes. The back of her head was badly bruised. It was apparent that the woman was dead before the fire started, and the fire had all the appearance of being incendiary. Ladouceur told a rambling story and blood was found on his clothing.

Canadian Cattle Barred.

London, Dec. 12.—The British Government has refused its sanction to a scheme proposed by a powerful syndicate to bring cattle and sheep from South America, Canada and elsewhere to the British island of Alderney, where it was planned to slaughter them and distribute the carcasses in Great Britain. The hides and by-products were to be treated for the benefit of the British leather industry, with the view of combating the American beef and leather combine.

Mr. Fisher Will Expend \$60,000 On Useless Inspection

TO KEEP EXPORT TRADE

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—In the House yesterday, in reply to R. L. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the reason why he had no information to give concerning Hon. Mr. Hyman's resignation was that that gentleman was so ill that he was not allowed by his physician to even receive his letters. With regard to the failure to appoint a judge to the supreme court of Nova Scotia and the delay in appointing a solicitor-general, the Premier said other more important business had been too pressing.

For An Eight Hour Day.

Mr. Velville (Maisonnette) introduced his bill providing for an eight-hour day for all laborers employed on public works.

More Rigid Inspection.

Mr. Fisher moved the House into committee upon his resolution:

"That it is expedient to pass an act to provide for the further provision and inspection of canned food products, meats and fish, and for the appointment of inspectors for the enforcement of the act."

He explained that the recent revelations respecting the Chicago packing houses made some legislation expedient. He was pleased to announce that the investigations conducted by the department through W. W. Moore had shown on the whole quite a satisfactory condition of affairs in Canada. Personally, he deemed any inspection or supervision unnecessary. It would be, so far as the domestic trade was concerned; but in order to keep the foreign market, including Britain, it was best to establish official inspection. The United States Congress had passed a drastic law providing for the inspection and supervision of packing houses. "We must have our laws as strict if we hoped to keep the export trade. He would go further and extend the proposed statute to include vegetables. He also thought that the date of canning should be labeled on the can."

In reply to Mr. Monk, Mr. Fisher said: We will ask for an appropriation this year of \$60,000. It will safeguard export trade amounting to \$30,000,000.

After much desultory discussion, the resolution passed and a bill embodying its provisions received a first reading.

Tariff Talk in the House.

The intermediate tariff came in for discussion at the evening session of the House.

The committee rose at 10 o'clock without having made any visible progress. They will only be two more Government days before the Christmas recess, and it is not likely that work on the tariff will begin in earnest until after the holidays.

The House will adjourn from Thursday, Dec. 20, to Tuesday, Jan. 8.

O.I.B. OFFICIAL INQUIRY.

Commissioner Snow Orders Charge Against Engineer Wilson.

Brantford, Dec. 12.—The feature of the enquiry at O.I.B. yesterday morning was a request by Commissioner Snow that a charge of partisanship be laid against Chief Engineer Wilson. The request arose out of certain statements made in evidence of previous witnesses who were Reform workers and who claimed Wilson furnished them with election information. Other partisan acts are also alleged in the case.

Wilson was called before the commission, and wished time to prepare his defense, which was granted. The examination of Burrow Hossie occupied the whole of the session. It is understood that other officials will come before the commission on a charge of partisanship, charges against several of whom are now being prepared.

Cataract Co. Loses Suit.

Hamilton, Dec. 12.—The city has won one money victory in its case against the Cataract Power Co. The company contended that it was not called upon by its agreement to pay a percentage of its earnings on the Jockey Club line, and that it had to pay a percentage only on its coal, water and light bills. The court decided in favor of the city.

Mayor Biggar has appointed Aldermen Stewart, Wilton and Toward as the special committee to ascertain from the Cataract Power Co. the price at which it will sell the street railway to the city.

Money Burns In Cobalt Fire.

Cobalt, Nov. 12.—A fire occurred in the French quarter in the northern part of the town yesterday afternoon, beginning at 12:30. The buildings burned were a butcher shop and shoe store adjoining, and it was found necessary to demolish a log cabin to keep the flames from spreading further. The owner of the two shops is not known, having set up in a business but a few days. His loss included \$300 in the till of the butcher shop. The total loss was about \$2,500.

Mr. Hyslop Chosen.

Brussels, Dec. 12.—One of the largest conventions in the history of East Huron was held here yesterday to select a candidate for the Commons. Dr. McDonald, the member, was present, and declined to be a candidate. A. Hyslop, M.P.P. for the same riding, was the unanimous choice of the meeting.

A convention will be held at once to place a candidate in the field for the local House.
