

Mad Mullah Defeated.

ADEN, June 22. - The Mad Mallah after the recent repulse by Captain MacNeill of his attack upon British Zareba, accidently encountered the main British force of cavalry and mounted infantry, which immediately attacked and routed the Mullah. The pursuit was continued throughout the night. A hundred of the enemy were killed and the Mullah and the Sultan of Nur narrowly escaped capture. The British force lost seven killed and wounded.
