**JUMPER PORTS.**  
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**POSTOFFICE.**—A letter from Lisbon says— It  
may be recollecting that during the struggle between  
the brothers Don Pedro and Don Miguel for the  
sovereignty of the country, Lissa was sought by  
the partisans of each, and Pedro having been suc-  
cessful, repudiated all loans contracted by Don  
Miguel. It happened, however, that an Irishman  
born near 1,000,000 near to the Government  
of Don Miguel, as the war was drawing to a close  
90,000,000, or thereabouts, reached Lisbon,  
and was duly appropriated, but the remainder of  
the loan fell into the hands of the Government of  
Donna Maria. No part of the loan was recouped,  
but some knowing persons considering that  
a loan to a Government is false, receive and ap-  
propriated, is binding on its successor, and having  
legally possessed themselves of the funds, or what-  
ever other name the securities bear, have so far in-  
terested the French Government in their favour,  
that Napoleon III. has directed his ambassador  
here to make a preliminary demand upon the Por-  
tuguese Government for the principal and all interest,  
nearly about 30 years—requiring immediate  
payment; and last week the Ministers of Donna  
Maria II. went to the British Minister, to ask  
the aid of the British Government in their suc-  
ceeded distress. The indemnity demands drag on,  
they have been for some time, but the British  
Minister is very friendly to the little popularity  
which they enjoyed. Salazar's illness becomes  
more serious, and who is to succeed him is a  
question which it becomes every day more diffi-  
cult to answer.

**THE SIAMER TWINS.**  
CHASE and Eric, the well known Siamese Brothers  
who created a great sensation in Europe and America  
24 years ago, again made their debut before the Boston  
public on Monday last, and continue to hold their  
place at the Horticultural Hall every afternoon and evening.  
The Siamese Twins make their present appearance  
before the public under altered circumstances. They are  
now American citizens, and are accompanied by two  
years have elapsed since their marriage with two sisters,  
in North Carolina, and the interval has been improved by  
the birth of 11 children, 5 of the male and 6 of the other.  
As their progeny may increase, and as the paternal desire  
to provide for them is strong, they have thought it advi-  
sable to appear in public, and are daily visited by  
crowds of curious people from Boston and its vicinity.

Chase and Eric are now in the 43d year of their age;  
they are joined together by a cartilaginous band which  
passes from the sternum of the breast of one, to the breast  
bone of the other. Any idea of separating them is out  
of the question; they get through the business of life labor-  
ing together as they could apart. In each their bodily frame  
is robust, healthy and vigorous. The external right arm  
and leg of one and the corresponding left arm and leg of  
the other, are large, more muscular and more vigorous  
than the other limbs, or those nearest to the trunk; and  
separation would be tantamount to a dismembering, by  
cutting the cartilage on one side. The question has  
often arisen, and will be to us; What if one should  
die before the other? Will the survivor be soon separ-  
ated, or remain exposed to the certain death of decomposi-  
tion? Of course the separation would be made by  
dividing the band as far from the survivor as possible;  
and if the band is really cartilaginous, with comparative-  
ly little risk to the second life. But, if on the other hand,  
a communication exists, as some have conjectured, be-  
tween the cavity of the chest and the corresponding band,  
then the result would be very problematical.

The Siamese twins are really as intelligent, agreeable  
and well informed, as they have profited. They led Stan-  
ard at the age of 16—they have travelled by the education of  
observation in their intercourse with Europeans and Ameri-  
cans, and have shown that it can be achieved in modeling  
the mind in the forms and habits of civilized life. Nor is  
there in reality, anything peculiar or singular in this cir-  
cumstance, if we consider that in the world there are  
many twin children, and of the same sex, who are born  
separated, and in some instances, the children are joined  
in the most extraordinary manner. Some of the most  
extraordinary cases of monstrosity it is otherwise. The Siamese twins had  
a Chinese father and a Siamese mother. All their chil-  
dren are fully and perfectly developed, and the boy and  
girl with them are fine, well formed children, with the  
Asiatic complexion and Chinese eyes, but in all other  
respects perfectly of the form and organization the  
European parent, rather than the Siamese.

with something more useful and entertaining.  
We have, however, to set the Editor of the  
*Islander* right upon two or three obvious facts  
of which he seems to be ignorant.

In the first place, we would inform him, that  
Mr. Irving is not the Editor of this paper, nor  
has he written anything for it, except the Reports  
since the first of April. The Proprietor  
could not endorse, to their full extent, some of  
the opinions of his Editor, and they mutually  
dissolved the connexion. *Haszard's Gazette*, has  
always been, but is now more particularly, "the  
people's paper," and has always commanded the  
largest circulation in the island, which is a  
proof of the assertion. It exposes no party,  
but the good of the country generally, and it  
will give praise to whomsoever it may be  
due, and to censure, and with a fearless hand,  
those who may deserve it; and we feel assured,  
that this course will tell better, and carry greater  
weight, than if we were incessantly pouring  
a torrent of abuse against any party who  
opposed us. We thought that we had been par-  
ticularly mild in our censures of Mr. Young, or  
at least that we had said but little of what we  
could say. However, as there has been so much  
debate, of which his conduct has been the prin-  
cipal subject, perhaps our readers have heard  
enough; and they have only to read his own  
speech, to know what the country generally will  
think of him. The former editor of this paper  
before it falls into the hands of the present  
proprietor, conspired the government for the  
appointing Mr. Young to the office of Judge  
Proctor. We endorse the course, as we consider  
it a violation of the principles they professed;  
and they seem to have paid the penalty by his  
being the first to censure them, and to be un-  
equalled. We do not know whether Whelan com-  
mitted himself as much as Capt. Swanby, in his  
defense of Mr. Young; but we think he differed  
so far in opinion with his colleagues that, had  
he any spirit in him, he would have resigned.  
He knows, however, but too well that he has  
got all he can out of the printing this year; and  
it is not likely he will have an opportunity an-  
other; for, if the Government or the House of  
Assembly do not bring forward a Bill to fix  
a reasonable scale of prices, some of the in-  
dependent members of the Legislature, we think  
are sold, will be prepared to do so.
