

Inauguration of President and Vice-President at Wa hington

Washington, D.C Feb 4-Outward and visible signs of the inaugura. tion one month from today of Calvin Coolidge as President of the United States and Charles G. Dawes as Vice President are now to be seen on every hand. Within another week hundreds of carpenters will be busy with the work of putting up the re viewing stands that are to live both sides of Pennsylvania Ave. from the Capitol to Washington Square several blocks west of the White House. The details of the coming event have all been worked out. With the exception that there will be no grand ball this inauguration will not differ in any material respects from other presidential inaugurations of the last fifteen years The pleas of the President for simplicity has gone unheeded.

The two big features of the pronetion of the President and Vice President into office at the Capitol parade that will follow hese ceremonies. President Coolidge has given the parade his ofncial approval and the committee in charge intends to make it one of the most imposing processions that has ever manched through the strects of the capital on inauguration day. The programme has been arranged on the assumption that the weather will be such as will permit people to be outdoors.

The programme for the ceremonies that are to accompany the swearing in of the President and ice President starts the day's ceemonies with the inauguration of

The demand for seats on the refrom which the procession may be viewed is almost unprecedented. All the information that is coming to the inaugural committee indicates that one of the largest crowds that has ever witnessed the inauguration of a President will be here. people of the national capital are preparing to take care of several hundred thousand visitors.


