POULTRY BREEDING PLANT.

In order to encourage the more extensive raising of poultry and to make it more profitable than it has been, the Provincial Department of Agriculture has for some time been negotiating for a suitable location for the establishment of 'a government poultry plant, where pure bred birds' and eggs of the leading varieties may raised for breeding purposes. agriculture, when seen by a Bulletin representative this morning, stated that arrangements had been made with the Hudson's Bay Company for a lease of eight or ten acres of land as a site for the plant.

The location is north of Rat Creek, and opposite block 3 of the Norwood survey on First street. It is the in-tention of the department to erect a poultry breeding plant with a capa-city of from 300 to 500 birds, and

city of from 300 to 500 birds, and built to entarge as conditions require. The birds and poultry appliances at present on the grounds of the Hudson's Bay Fort will be transferred as soon as possible.

It is the intention to trap nest all the breeding stock with the object of selecting the best layers to build up a laying strain of the various varieties. Sitting eggs from the best laying birds will be sold to farmers at a low rate in order to build up the laying qualities of their flocks. Attention will also be given to fleshing ability, the idea being to develop fowl that will be profitable for table use the second of the se
