LOCAL

E. J. Clark is putting in a ferry at the foot of Twenty-first street to facilitate hauling sand and gravel from the south side of the river. He expects to have it in operation in about two weeks.
E. Casey, of Andrew, has delivered twelve young moose at Elk Park, Lamont. The moose were caught under instructions from Howard Douglas, Dominion Park Commissioner.
Sunday evening service in McDougall Methodist church commemorated the confederation of Canada on July 1st, 1867, by a patriotic song service by the choir and an address by the acting pastor, Rev. C. S. Laidman.
Arthur Hawkes, of the C. N. R., has informed Secretary Harrison, of the Board of Trade, that a biograph operator wishes to get some good pictures of Edmonton and district for use in Great Britain and on this continent.

C.N.R. TO CAMROSE

In addition to this, the G.T.P. have filed plans for a road through Camrose and have had same approved by the board in most places. W. L. Leroi Ferguson is a breeder of Holstein cattle, and is attending the fair this year for the first time, but who will be heard from again as he has come to Edmonton to stay. Two years ago Mr. Ferguson, who is a young man, came west from New Brunswick to look over the country with a view to going into dairying. He was so impressed with the Edmonton district that he bought a farm on the Poplar Lake trail, six miles out of Edmonton, and prepared to stock up with dairy cattle. He returned to New Brunswick with such glowing reports of the opportunities in Alberta that he immediately contacted his father and the latter family to turn their backs on the old King's covey homestead and to strike for the west.
On March 28, the Ferguson family arrived in Edmonton with a herd of Holsteins, six of which were successful in being exhibited at the Edmonton fair. The cattle were purchased in Amherst Nova Scotia, and are of the very best

BIG GENERATOR ARRIVES

The big 1,200 kilowatt generator to furnish additional electric light and power of the city, arrived Tuesday and work of installation will be commenced at the power house at once. The new generator is expected to furnish ample power for use in the city, outside of the street railway demands, for some time to come. It will be operated by the large Goldie-McCallum engine, which is now on the way here. It is expected that this part of the plant will be ready by the end of September. The work of installing the new Robbins engine and generator, for the street car service, is going ahead rapidly.

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PROGRESS OF THE POST OFFICE

Alex. May, postmaster, stated to a Bulletin representative Monday that progress made in the new premises will not be completed until the first of August.
"By that date," said Mr. May, "there will remain a great deal of the interior work to be done before the building could be said to be completed."

MORE STREET CARS ARRIVE

Two more "pay as you enter" street cars from the shops of the Preston Car Co., Preston, came to hand Sunday night over the C.P.R. and are in the city yards today. The cars are the exact counterpart of those which arrived some time ago, one of which was used on the streets last week. The new cars cannot all be brought into use, however, until the street car department is supplied with additional power. It is likely that in the next few weeks the street car superintendent will ask for authority to purchase six more cars of the same kind.

LAND OFFICE RETURNS

The report of the Dominion Land Office for the month of June shows a great increase in business. The number of the corresponding month of last year. In June of 1927, the number of homestead entries granted were 22 in comparison with 61 for June of this year. The number of applications recommended in June 1927 was 128 and in June 1928 were 588, and in June 1927, 5,728 letters sent in June, 1928, were 2,963 and in June, 1927, 5,910.

ANOTHER LANDSLIDE

The embankment along Grierson street has been falling away rapidly late. The residents of that section claim that two feet on the average fall away every day. Last Saturday some fifteen to twenty feet in width by thirty feet long fell without a moment's notice. When the owner of a leasehold house arrived to get them out of the stable, which had been partly undermined, he was obliged to cut a new doorway in the wall of the house as a result of the earth having fallen away. At the present time the edge of the embankment, on the south side of Grierson street, and at the rapid rate of the demolition of the earth, it is probable that the bank this side of the street will have to be protected in the matter has remained in abeyance.

STOCK FOR OJONIA LAKE

Among the crowd at the fair grounds Friday was Rev. J. R. Matheson, Anglican clergyman in charge of the Ojonia Lake mission, forty miles or so north of Lloydminster. Mr. Matheson, well known as a teacher of the Ojonia Lake mission, is in the city on his annual trip for supplies. Early next week he will proceed down the river to Ojonia Lake, where he will be engaged with about \$2,000 worth of settlers' effects and provisions for the four months of the winter. The mission is now being built on Fraser's flats.

To a Bulletin representative, Mr. Matheson said that, particularly in the large part of the specimens such as rats, bears and deer have been plentiful throughout the winter, and prices were being good. Foxes alone were scarce.
"There has been a great time of immigration into the district this winter," said Mr. Matheson. "In fact, settlers have been coming right along for the past few years. I'm making now, and I am going to go farther back in time, and I had to come to the river to see him, but now settlers are getting along together. I want to be in by myself, as in the old days."
Mr. Matheson says that the rich soil around the lake is attracting the settlers. They have 60% to 80% of the population of the area, and he has quoted on several townships before the survey. The survey which Dr. L. & Knight, of the Saskatchewan side will further attract settlers to the Ojonia Lake district.
