

SAYS ALDERMAN IS INTERESTED

Lively Fight Between Boulton and Grindley Over Machinery Tenders To Prepare New Gas Agreement

(From Thursday's Daily.) Personal interest was charged against Ald. Grindley by Commissioner Boulton during a discussion of tenders for power machinery at the regular meeting of the city council last evening. The recommendations of the commission, embodied in an elaborate report, were meeting with no little opposition from a section of the council of which Ald. Grindley seemed to be the acknowledged leader. The ire of the commissioner was aroused by the frequent interruptions and caustic comments of the alderman, who was insisting repeatedly upon the abilities of Engineer Parsons and the opening of the report which he submitted recently to the council.

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THE FORMAL OPENING OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL

To Be Held on Tuesday Next—Premier Sifton and Hon. C. R. Mitchell to Officiate at the Ceremony—A Souvenir Souvenir

(From Thursday's Daily.) The formal opening of the new High School is to take place on Tuesday next at five o'clock in the afternoon. Premier Sifton will declare the building open and Minister of Education Mitchell will present and make a short address. Other youthfulness educationalists have been invited, including the inspectors of schools in the different towns and cities of Alberta. The program of addresses will be interspersed with music. The High School pupils will be there in a body and the meeting is open to the public.

The opening was made a day function in order to give the opportunity for the inspection of the school.

An interesting feature in connection with the opening is the preparation for the occasion of a souvenir booklet, which will contain the history of Edmonton's schools and setting forth the ideas that characterize this city. A copy will be presented at the opening.

NEW MOVE IN THE CITY HALL FIGHT

Will Attempt to Secure Appointment of Two Additional Commissioners—Alderman Lundy Gives Notice of Motion

Alderman Lundy gave notice at the adjourned meeting of the council, held yesterday afternoon that on Tuesday next he would introduce a motion for the appointment forthwith of two additional commissioners to be selected by the council as a matter of expediency.

This step can be accomplished only by a three-fourths vote. That it will meet with opposition from Ald. Hyndman and Ald. McKinley is certain. The addition of a third vote to the majority would be sufficient to rob the motion of its three-fourths vote necessary to the passage of the motion.

For the moment speculation centers in the names of the appointees to the positions on the board of commissioners which it is intended to create. The alderman concerned refused to divulge the names of the persons he had in mind, but it is believed that the secret lies behind a front of stony reserve.

"I have nothing to say," is the unvarying response to the question which has for its object the penetration of his mysterious designs. Nevertheless, it is believed that the alderman who has for his object the failure to respond to the call of such an occasion, is already busy with the preparation of a motion for the appointment of two additional commissioners.

The situation with regard to the gas agreement is not clear, and the negotiations are at a standstill. A number of the aldermen still favor enquiry into the practicability of operating a municipal plant, as was shown when a vote was taken early in the evening upon the question whether a hearing should be given to the committee desiring to submit estimates for such a plant.

Up to the present time the committee have worked separately, and the meeting was therefore only preliminary to more practical work.

The problem of representation was also discussed and it was agreed by a unanimous vote, that in the event of a union, the common council formed should be pro rata the population, with the proviso that there shall be not less than three members from the south side of the river.

Before the gathering broke up two committees were resolved into one permanent organization, with A. C. Fraser as permanent chairman, and A. A. Campbell as permanent secretary. The second meeting will be held on Thursday next in the council chamber at Edmonton.

Finer of Judge Travis. Calgary, May 7.—The remains of the late Judge Travis were laid to rest in the Union cemetery this afternoon. The funeral took place from the Church of the Redeemer at 10 o'clock, following a service preached by Rev. C. W. Horne. Going to health Mrs. Travis, who is at the present time in Santa Barbara, California, was unable to be present.

TWO MEN KILLED

Wire Rope Which They Were Handling Snapped Against Electric Cable

Conwall, Ont., May 7.—Peter Reck, of central Canada, and George Cook, an Indian from Strathgus, were instantly killed here this afternoon. They were working along the canal bank and stopped to lend a hand to some man who were hoisting a new boom of a derrick at J. E. Cheyette's coal sheds.

Several men were hauling in a wire rope to which a hemp rope was attached when the high wind swung them against the wire of St. Lawrence Power Co., which was carrying a current of 1,000 volts to the Canadian cotton mill. The wire rope came in contact with the power wire and both men and Cook, who were in the vicinity, were electrocuted.

Reck was about thirty-five or forty years of age and leaves a wife and six young children.
