The Last Kick.

LONDON, To-Day.
The progress of the Veto Bill towards a crisis next week is coming into clearer light. Lord Morley yesterday published a list of 76 Liberal peers who had promised to support the Government in the passage of the measure. There was a meeting held yesterday of Unionist peers who are in favor of supporting the Government. It was decided not to be advisable to take organized action on the vote for the bill but to leave each peer to act on his own discretion. The bill, according to present probabilities will be adopted by a narrow majority. The insurgents continue to breathe defiance to the Government. They had a crowded meeting in London last night. The chief burden of their speeches was a denunciation of the Government, for what they termed the revolutionary proceedings in dragging King George into politics at the behest of Redmond. A resolution pledging them to a "no surrender" policy was carried amidst enthusiasm. Most of the papers approve of the signing yesterday of the Arbitration Treaty between Britain and the States. It is claimed that the outcome is in the form of an anti-climax as compared with what the enthusiasts contemplated originally.

Bishop on Beer Barrels

Dr. Percival, the aged Bishop of Hereford, Eng., whose invitation to Nonconformist ministers to take part in the coronation services in his cathedral has aroused considerable criticism, was for many years head master of Clifton and also of Rugby. He himself was educated at the Kirk by Stephen and Appleby Grammar schools, and as an instance of the educational value of such institutions, he has said that "if he had not been educated there he would, in all probability, have remained an obscure fell-side farmer, grubbing at the weather, the crops, and probably the Government." Dr. Percival is something of a wit. One day he was passing through a town noted for its beer, and he observed many signs of brewing and also of mourning. "Why is that flag half-mast high?" he inquired. He was told that someone well known in the town was dead. "Ah, how sad," he observed, "I observe that even the barrels are in tiers."

"Crossing the Bar."

"It Came in a Moment" Said Tennyson of His Great Song.
Parallel to the thoughts on immortality and the hereafter as Dr. Lowry expressed them is Lord Alfred Tennyson's noble death song, "Crossing the Bar." One of the three greatest death songs ever written, it comes to us as a sublime prayer, a humble petition, a sacred belief of a great man.
It was while crossing the Solent with his son Hallam late one October's afternoon that the words came to the mind of the poet, who died just recovered from a seizure of sickness. Reaching his home, he at once sat down and penned the lines. Showing the poem to his son, he declared, "It came in a moment." Three years after the birth of the lines Sir Alfred passed away, but the prayer he uttered on that memorable afternoon remains a fitting memorial not only to the English poet laureate, but to the memory of those who have gone before us and who helped to lay the foundation of our liberal faith and liberal education. In it are blended the unflinching trust and belief of all humanity.

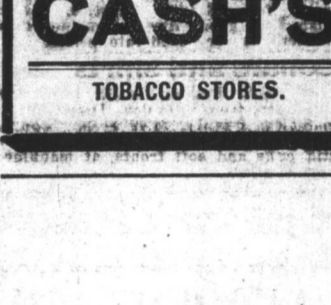
