## Debt and Its Penalty.

In an article in our last issue on the subject of Balance of Trade, we showed that our excess of imports over our exports was a danger signal that we were buying more than we could pay for, that we were consuming more than we produced and that we were paying the balance by running into debt. We doubt, however, if our people as a whole realize the enormous disadvantage which a large public debt entails upon a community. They are so obsessed with a senseless Government expenditure, of abundant and highly paid labor that they do not reason as to how such expenditure is going to effect the life and comfort of the people of the future. It is not the habit of the sly politician to explain to the voters how they will have to pay back every farthing of debt by increased taxation and by diminished food and clothing, it is his low down trick to appeal to their ignorance of natural economic laws, by showing the glittering tinsel of present abundance. What does our readers think would have been the result of an appeal to the people for senseless Branch Railway lines, if their advocates went into each settlement and house in the Colony and told the inmates that as a result of the adoption of the Railway policy a tax collector would call round every year to each house to collect \$5.00 from every family? Would not the proposition have been received with scorn and the proposer buried in ridicule? But this is what is happening. These Railways are going to cost \$8,000,000 and every year after the people will have to pay \$280,000 merely by way of interest, that is one dollar per head of population or five dollars per family, till the debt is paid off. If it ever is.

But the debt for the Branch Railways, immense and burdensome as it is, is not a quarter of the load of debt the people of this Colony are called upon to bear. We stated in our last issue that it was from \$550 to \$600 for every family but on the completion of the Branch lines the total debt will be near \$32,000,000, a sum almost too vast to grasp or comprehend, and this works out at \$660 for every family, which means that every family also pays by way of interest about \$25 every year, and pays it just as completely as if the tax collector called round every year and forced its payment in cash. Now consider what that \$25 would mean in increased comfort to every family in the Island. Suppose that in the fall of the year when every housewife and her good man are counting up the dollars that they have available for supplying their season's wants, they were to have an additional sum of \$25 put into their hands, what prospects of increased comfort and better food supplies, would it not bring. Would it not be largely instrumental in lifting up the standard of living throughout the whole Island, and removing altogether that monotonous and spare diet which Dr. Wakefield, who is doing such unselfish and splendid work for the health of the people of this Colony, says is such a large factor in creating a tendency to that fatal disease—consumption. As we said it is not in the interest of the politician to explain these matters to the people from whom he is looking for votes. He propounds glittering schemes of employment which fascinate the people by their splendor, and he obtains the votes he requires. The result comes just as surely as the clap of thunder after the flash of the lightning. You have spent money which you have not earned and you must pay it back with interest, even though you pay it through much suffering.

We say unhesitatingly that under a Government conducted solely in the interest of the whole Colony, and on thorough business principles, the Revenues of Newfoundland would have been abundant for all necessary purposes and that the public debt to speak of would ever have been created. It is only owing to the exigencies of party warfare, the pressure of the outs against the ins and the ins against the outs that the tremendous burden of debt has been piled on the unresisting shoulders of poor old Newfoundland, and she has to bear it. But even now under an economical and business Government much could be done through reform in the Civil Service and a more careful and economic expenditure of public monies to lessen the outrageous taxation which the people of this Colony are now carrying. The reduction of the tariff is the one imperative, nay, indispensable, thing for the well-being of the people and any party which will come out boldly and honestly and make Reform of expenditure and Reduction of taxation the leading planks in its platform should receive the whole-hearted support of every thinking man in the community.—The People.

BERLIN, June 12.

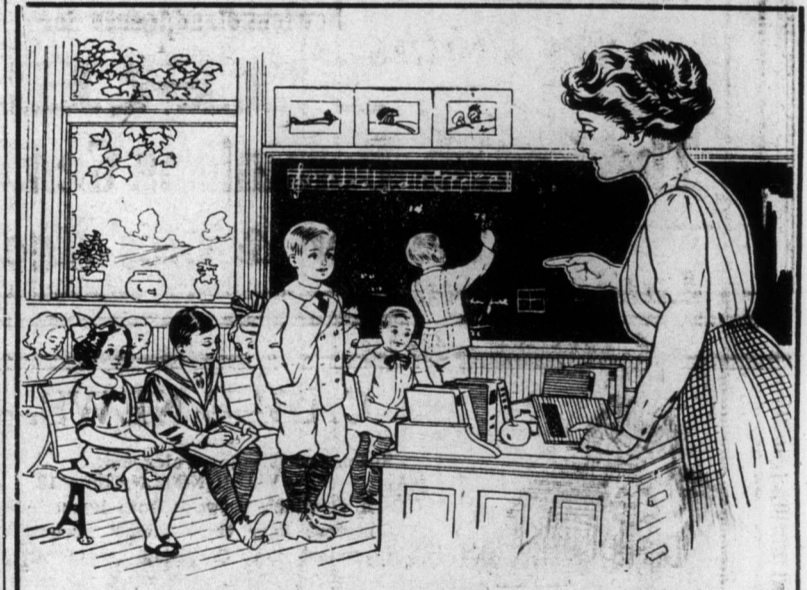

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, June 12.  
With the exception of half a dozen ports, where there have been a partial response to the demand of the London leaders of the transport workers' strike for a national stoppage, the call thus far has been abortive. Work in provincial centres is progressing almost normally to-day. According to the opinion of well informed persons, it is a safe prophecy that the ballot being taken among the members of the Sailors' and Firemen's Union will not result in the necessary two-thirds majority being obtained for the whole Union to strike. Failing the participation of its 90,000 members, the strike is foredoomed to failure. About 10,000 non-unionist strike breakers are now working about the London docks.

## Crushed to Death

DIGBY, June 9.—A fatal accident occurred at the Government wharf yesterday afternoon, a few minutes before the steamer Prince Rupert sailed for St. John. The freight handlers were down on the slip, having a few minutes to wait before the express arrived from Halifax. While running up and down the slip, skiffing with each other, a young fellow, Piemen Sparrod, aged about 47, got caught between a piece of piling and the steamer's guard just forward of the paddle wheel, crushing his chest. As he was released by the steamer slightly moving, he fell between the slip and the wharf.  
About an hour after the Rupert sailed his comrades were successful in bringing the body to the surface with grappling irons. He was evidently killed, however, before going into the water. An inquest was held before Coroner Daley and a verdict returned in accordance with the facts.
