More Recruits Wanted.

The duration of the war will depend largely on the number of men and the shot and shell which the Entente Allies can hurl against Germany, Austria and Turkey during the next six months. On the western front the Germans are held up by the Allies who have made successful advances at Neuve Chapelle and Epargne. In the East, the Russians are not only holding the Germans and Austrians in the North and the centre of the line but after the reduction of Premysl they have captured the passes of the Carpathians and are apparently depending on the plains of Hungary. The Allies are also planning to follow up the destruction of the forts in the first stretch of the Dardanelles by a combined land and sea attack on the Dardanelles. The time which it will take to overpower Turkey and Austria will depend on the attitude of Italy and Roumania. Bulgaria and Greece. The entry of Italy into the war depends on whether Austria will yield Trentino to her without war. If she does so, then Italy will not be a factor on the side of the Entente. If Austria refuses, then Italy will be a big factor in the more speedy termination of the war and her entrance into the war will have its influence in deciding Roumania and the others in casting their lot in with us. Should this come about Bulgaria would probably attack Adrianople and aid in driving the Turks from Europe, and Roumania would join with Russia and Italy in a joint campaign directed at Buda Pesth and Vienna and before the autumn closes we should not be surprised to see Austria and Turkey occupied by the Allies, and Russia, Italy and France joining hands through South Germany. If, however, Italy is satisfied by Austria and does not enter the war, the campaign will be prolonged, and every recruit that Britain can get will be needed for a stubborn and prolonged fight through Northern France and Belgium. Britain is providing for either event and a new recruiting campaign has been started in London, which we have no doubt will meet with a ready response.

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Mild. Reservists Earn Recognition.

The Governor has received in personal correspondence a communication from Captain Corbett, H.M.C.S. Nicke, regarding the men of the Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve, serving on board that ship.

These men have practically given no trouble and are most unknown to the Captain as defaulters. They are most able and willing, which speaks highly for their previous training. The two sea boats are manned entirely by them, and they have had constant work boarding ships in all weathers. Captain Corbett says that he is prepared to back them against any boat crew of the Imperial ships on the station.

Missionary Service at Wesley Church

Dr. Curtis, who delivered a very able sermon from the words in our "Lord's Prayer," "Thy Kingdom Come"—and as the preacher reviewed the progress among the nations, the fearful conflict for the mastery with loss of life, and consequent suffering, the barbarous treatment of Belgium, who for her part had now a King without a kingdom; the anxiety as to the issue and arrangement at the close of the Great War, it made all Christians pray and long more earnestly when His name shall be hallowed, His Kingdom fill the whole earth, and His will be done. The Anthem by the choir was fine.

In the afternoon at Sunday School service, addresses were delivered by Mr. Wm. Wilkinson and Rev. H. Godfrey. The inclement weather was at its worst and scholars were kept from the evening service, still the attendance was greater than could be expected in such a rainstorm. John Leamon, Esq., made an ideal Chairman. Men Out All Night.

CAPT. B. BARBOUR AND FIVE MEN GO TO RESCUE OF SEVEN OF HIS CREW.
(Copy of message from s.s. Neptune, dated April 12th, 1915.)
"On Saturday evening seven men were unable to get on board owing to lack of water. Myself with five others went to their rescue and drifted away fifteen miles from the ship. Reached men on Sunday morning. Walked 15 miles to Nascopie reaching her at 2 p.m. All ships jammed; Capt. Kean, after great efforts to free Flonzie, 5 miles N.W. of Snap Rock, succeeded and came to Nascopie and took us from Nascopie to our own ship, reaching her at 8 p.m. All well. Our position is 2 miles north of Gapple Island, jammed."

Fire at Dry Goods Store

While the fire was in progress, the residence of Mr. Thos. Freeman, which is over the store, became filled with smoke and Mrs. Freeman, the owner's mother, who is in her 86th year, was with much difficulty, taken from the house by Supt. Dunn and brought to a place of safety. The damage done to the stock of dry goods in Mr. Noah's store by fire and water was extensive, and we understand no insurance was carried, though the building is partially covered.

Dory Seen Bottom Up.

Captain Slade, of the barge, Ada Pearl, which arrived here Saturday night, reports having passed a dory on Wednesday night, April 7th, in the region of two hundred and fifty miles S.W. of Cape Race. The dory was bottom up and drifting about. It was apparently like the ordinary banking dory, bore no marks and supposed to belong to some banking vessel. There is a theory that the dory belonged to a Gloucester banker, which is supposed to have been engaged halibut fishing which they do every winter season on the Grand Banks and in that event it may be that two men were in the dory and it capsized.

Attempted Suicide.

Constable Forsey, of Gambo, came to the city yesterday, bringing along with him a man named Napier, of Port Blandford, who is alleged to have attempted suicide and who is believed to be of unsound mind. He was tried before Judge Knight to-day charged with loose and disorderly conduct. The evidence of the Constable, who also learned similar reports from the Justice of the Peace at Port Blandford, showed that Napier had frequently tried to end his life in a rash way and that his son had prevented him from cutting his throat with a knife, taking the weapon away from the supposed lunatic. Pending further investigation by the authorities Napier has been remanded.

A LITTLE FORETHOUGHT FOR BLEMISHES.

Sometimes an overindulgence in French pastry, an ice cream order, or even carelessness when cleansing the face, will cause little skin blotches to appear. Let judicious forethought rule one's daily diet and the skin will assume its own natural delicacy without much fretting about it. Young girls are more prone to extravagant delicacies than their wise elders.

The permanent marks, moles, warts or brown spots may, in some cases, be removed by a physician, operation is slight—a tiny strip of skin cut out, the edges sewn up and healed, leaving only a fine white scar in place of the unsightly blemishes.

But such matters should be left entirely in the hands of an expert, as well as the disorders of the digestion which make skin eruptions. You may, however, treat some surface marks yourself.
