### Milady's Boudoir.

BEAUTIFUL TEETH.  
My readers are urged to care for their teeth as they would for precious pearls, not only for the sake of personal appearance but for the sake of the health. The cause of most weak stomachs is bad teeth. When the teeth are decayed and sensitive it is almost impossible to chew ones food properly. You should brush your teeth after every meal and use paste. In brushing the teeth you should first brush lengthwise in the ordinary way and then, with the teeth closed, scrub well up and down into the gums. From there pass on to the inside of the teeth, brushing thoroughly the inner part of the upper and lower front teeth. When they have been cleaned this way, hold the brush upright in your hand and, with the jaws open, brush up and down with the grain of the teeth. In the morning the tongue and gums should be given a thorough cleaning with a special paste. After each meal when the teeth have been brushed, run a piece of dental floss between each two teeth. If you are away from home or in an office have an extra toothbrush and a piece of dental floss with you to be used after lunch every day. For sanitary

## EARLY ME

### BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 2. (Official.) Norfolk troops carried out a successful raid last night south of Armentieres. They killed or took prisoners a number of the enemy. Prisoners were brought in by our patrols in the neighborhood of Aldeux en Gohelle. Raids were attempted by the enemy during the night at several points. Two hostile raiding parties succeeded in entering our line in St. Quentin sector. A few of our men are missing. In a third raid attempted by the enemy in the neighborhood of Hargincourt a few of his troops also succeeded in reaching our trenches where they were all killed or captured. After a heavy bombardment carried out early this morning on a wide front from Neuve Chapelle northward, a strong hostile raiding party attacked and entered Forward enemy front trenches in this area. The enemy was promptly ejected by an immediate counter attack which completely restored the situation. Other hostile raids in the neighborhood of the Ypres-Comines Canal and south of Houthoult Forest also were repulsed with loss to the enemy. We captured a few prisoners and a machine gun. The enemy artillery has shown considerable activity during the night in connection with his raids also in the Passchendaele sector.

AMSTERDAM, March 3. According to the Vossische Zeitung, of Berlin, peace negotiations at Bucharest, Roumania, have failed. It is understood King Ferdinand's reply to the Central Powers was unsatisfactory.

MILITARY MOVEMENT IN RUSSIA  
BERLIN, March 3. By reason of the signing of the peace treaty with the Bolsheviks, say an official communication from headquarters to-night, military movements in Great Russia have ceased.

AMSTERDAM, March 3. Semi-official German and Austrian statements received here to-day set forth claims of forward steps toward peace between the Central Powers and Roumania. A Berlin despatch
