

A Notable Reign On June 4, 1736, George the Third, King of Great Britain, was born, and on October 25, 1760, he succeeded George the second, his grandfather, in that sovereignty, because his father, Frederick, Price of Wales, son of the previous king, had died in 1751. He was the first of the Hanoverian line of British sovereigns born in England, and he made it his boast that he was a true-born Englishman, George the First having been ruler of Hanover, called Elector, in Germany, before he succeeded to the British throne at the death of Queen Anne, in 1714, and George the Second came to England with him. George the First spent on the Continent a great part of the rest of his life; while George the Second could never learn much of the English language, so that he left ecclesiastical appointments very much to Queen Caroline, his wife, to whom Joseph Butler, so celebrated as the author of the "Analogy of Religion," was Clerk of the Closet, or private secretary, and through whom he became Bishop of first Bristol, and afterwards of Durham. George the Third was greatly indebted to his mother for the formation of his mind and character, and throughout his life his reputation was unspotted. After nearly sixty years' reign, he died when eightly-one years of age. In 1764, the fourth year of his reign, he suffered for six weeks from weakness of mind, and again from 1789 for four months. From 1810 till his death in 1820, he experienced his last and long attack of insanity, his eldest son and successor, George the Fourth, having to be appointed Regent. This mental complaint was, it is thought, due to the war between Britain and its American Colonies by which the present United States obtained their independence, and to that between the British and revolutionary France; besides this king's opposition to Roman Catholic emancipation in his dominions, and the death of Amelia, the youngest of his fifteen children. Towards the end of his life his favourite seaside resort was Weymouth, in Dorsetshire, to which he thus gave popularity, as his son, George the Fourth, did to Brighton. George the Third made such use of the land attached to Windsor Castle, and did so much in improving agriculture throughout the country, that he was called "Farmer George." But that title was no insult, and only fitted to the name. For George is only an abbreviated pronunciation of a Greek word of three syllables meaning "earth-worker," used in the Bible (John xvi., Matt. xx. 33, 2 Tim., 11, 6, Jamesv. 7), but translated in the English one "husbandman." The reign of George the Third is very notable. During its course England acquired Canada and lost the American Colonies; there were such domestic episodes as "Wilkes and Liberty," with its important bearing on freedom of election and the liberty of the subject and the Gordon Riots, to illustrate the evils of intolerance; the Union with Ireland; the commencement of the great struggle for Parliamentyet greater struggle with Revolution-

ary and Napoleonic France. The list of his distinguished subjects includes Nelson, Wellington, the two Pitts, Fox, Warren Hastings, Dr. Johnson, Burke, Garrick, Goldsmith, Sheridan, Scott. Byron. Wordsworth and a host of others. But the portion of his reign most glorious to our arms, most brilliant in our literature, was the conclusion, throughout which the King was quite unconscious of the world without. Towards the close of 1810 the mental malady, from which already he had suffered, returned in an aggravated form, and thenceforward until his death ten years later, he never knew more than a glimpse of sanity. Of complete victory abroad. and political dissension at home-of Waterloo and of Peterloo-he remained ignorant, and he died unaware that

his wife, Queen Charlotte, had passed away more than a year before.

Cat and Dog Life.
