The Marquis of Milford Haven recently stated that the Victory was likely to sink at her moorings and he suggested a fund to repair her and pre serve her as a public memorial. "This was rather alarming news but enquiry on the spot showed that in the opinion of those on board the ressel, she is not much worse in condition than she was ten years ago, that they are not afraid of her foundering, and that she may be expected to last a good many years yet. "Of course, the condition of the Victory does not show above the water line. When I visited her recently, most of the interior woodwork seemed sound enough, and it was not necessary to use the great ni (sert mis an to two shem) amu order to get rid of any water. Nevertheless there is no doubt that the ship, well kept as she is, is full of dry rot, and is gradually decaying. She was commenced in 1759, and had actually been afloat for forty years.
