Polling Day and the Liqueur Store

We publish in another column certain correspondence which has taken place between the Returning Officer and the Chairman of the Liquor Control Board, and regardless of the interpretation which may be put on this or that section of the Act, we cannot refrain from saying that it appears to be much ado about nothing.

The Returning Officer's request to the Chairman is really nothing more than a formal intimation that an election is to be held, and a reminder of the customary practice with regard to the sales of liquor at such times. His action in the matter apparently comes within the scope of his authority, and the reply one would naturally expect from the Chairman of the Board would be a formal acknowledgment and a concurrence with the request. Instead there is a letter which savours of Bumbledom, although it must be clear to that official that not only is the closing of the stores a reasonable and desirable course, but one which has the full force of public opinion behind it.

If the present Act does not specify exactly on what days the stores shall close, it gives the Board every opportunity to exercise its discretion, a power which, as we have already pointed out, it might use to greater effect in other directions. The Act is based on that in operation in Quebec, and it may be of some assistance to the Board if deciding to act as requested if we point out that under the Quebec Act it is laid down specifically that stores will close . . . on days designated for federal, provincial or municipal elections in the districts in which they are situated.

Have A Care

This is the time of the year when the thin coating of ice covering the ponds offers to the ordinary boy a lure which he finds most difficult to resist. He tests it with the stone sent skidding across its glassy surface, and already convinced that it will bear his weight, he proves to his glee by this method how unerring is his judgement. Even the "bucky" effect his weight produces as he ventures a short distance, conveys no warning but rather adds zest to his exploit, and if he does manage to escape the spots where danger lurks it is only because fools seem to be able to rush in with impunity where angels dare to tread.

We are unaware of any form of argument that will convince youngsters that thin ice is dangerous, and the method of persuasion must be left to the judgment of their parents and others in a similar position of responsibility. Consequently we would just warn the latter that at present while the ice on the shallow ponds is just capable of bearing the weight of a child, the covering on the larger surfaces of water is anything but safe and for the present should be avoided.

Catholic Citizens

PREPARING PLANS FOR ARCH-BISHOP'S HOME-COMING.

The Aula Maxima at St. Bonaventure's College, was filled last night with an enthusiastic gathering of Roman Catholic citizens, who met to make arrangements to celebrate the home-coming of His Grace Archbishop Roche. Mr. W. H. Howley, K.C., presided, and amongst those on the platform were Rt. Rev. Monsignor Kitchin, Hon. Mr. Justice Kent, Hon. F. J. Morris, K.C., Col. C. O'N. Conroy, Messrs. J. V. O'Dea and J. C. Pippy, besides several of the Priests and Christian Brothers. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted unanimously, whilst the minutes of the special committee were also read and confirmed. This committee after careful consideration, recommended that the reception take the following forms: (1) A deputation consisting of the Priests, Christian Brothers and as many as possible of the Catholic citizens to meet the Archbishop on his arrival; (2) On the night of the arrival a parade of Catholic Societies and citizens, around the town to the Cathedral where an address will be presented to His Grace, who would reply and impart the Papal Blessing to the Cathedral; (3) The illuminated electrically. After the resolution had been put to the meeting, it was carried unanimously. The sub-committee consisting of Mr. Burke, Messrs. J. G. Higgins, B.L., and Mr. J. Fenelon, appointed to draft the address, submitted a draft copy. This was read to the meeting by Mr. Fenelon, on behalf of the committee. It was moved by Hon. Mr. Justice Kent and seconded by Col. Conroy that the address as read be adopted. This was carried unanimously. The matter of arranging for the big parade was then considered, and judging by the enthusiasm and the sentiments expressed by several of the speakers from the audience, it promises to be one of the largest of its kind ever held here. His Grace, it was announced, would arrive by the Rosalind on Monday next. A meeting of the Executive will be held to-morrow night when the full programme will be decided upon and arrangements made for the announcement.

Income Tax Cases Heard

FINES IMPOSED ON SIR RICHARD SQUIRES TOTAL \$6,400.

For failing to make his income tax returns for the five years of 1919, 1920, 1921, 1922, and 1923, Sir Richard Squires was fined a total of \$6,400 by Judge Morris this forenoon. The two cases previously disposed of, viz. for failure to make returns for the years 1918 and 1920, bring the total of fines up to \$6,400. Three of the cases disposed of previously were tried under the Act of 1922. The charges in all the other cases were under a previous Act. Mr. W. R. Howley for Sir Richard Squires was fined \$500 for failure to make returns for the years 1918 and 1920. Minister L. E. Emerson for the Minister of Finance called the assessor, Mr. Joseph O'Reilly, to prove the forms submitted as evidence. There was no cross-examination of the witness. It is understood that actions against other citizens for not making their income tax returns are pending.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

KING OF SPAIN AGREES TO ABOLITION OF DIRECTORATE. MADRID, Dec. 2. King Alfonso has agreed to the abolition of the military Directorate, and to its succession by a civil cabinet under Captain General Primo Rivera. The new Government is to take the oath of office before the King to-day.

KIRLING'S CONDITION. LONDON, Dec. 2. Rudyard Kipling passed a fairly good night. This morning it was said his condition was unchanged.

LEAGUE COMMISSION IMPOSE A HEAVY FINE ON GREECE. GENEVA, Dec. 2. The League of Nations Commission which inquired into the recent Greco-Bulgarian frontier incident finds Greece should pay Bulgaria twenty million francs. The Commission decided to recommend to the League of Nations Council that Greece should pay Bulgaria an additional six million francs for loss of lives.

NEW FRENCH COMMISSIONER. BEIRUT, Dec. 2. Henry de Jouvanel, France's new High Commissioner in Syria, landed here yesterday. He was greeted by the Syrian civil and military leaders and said he expected their cooperation in his efforts to bring about a lasting peace.

The Circus will close on Saturday night and in order that those working in the stores may have an opportunity of seeing the show, the vaudeville will not begin until 9.45. As 10.15 the coronation of the "Queen of the Circus" will take place, and in this connection all contestants are reminded that at the close of this evening's performance all voting will cease and only those tickets that are paid for will be eligible. A special committee is being appointed to check the ballots, and announce the bulletins and final result, and no member of the management of the Circus or employees will be permitted to assist. The count will begin at ten o'clock to-morrow morning, and an hourly bulletin in the window of the Maritime Drug Store on Water Street.
