Freed From Harems Now Seek Hubbies

ANGORA, Nov. 26 .- Hundreds of beautiful women, highly trained in the social graces, arts of the toflette, dancing, music and religion, who have been freed from harems, now have the Turkish government seeking husbands for them. Most of them are wholly unfitted for the practical

Abandonment of the harem also placed on the hands of the government many eunuchs, but their disposition has not been so difficult. In the absence of regular employment in the cities they have been sent to the provincial districts for work on tae

When President Mustapha Kemal assumed power in Angora, one of his first official acts was to banish the harems and slave households of Sultan Mohammed VI., the princes and

members of the Royal Court. In order to set an example, most of the Nationalist government officials have one, or at most only two wives. Indeed, Mustapha Kemal Pasha has no wife at all, having recently been granted a divorce. Economic conditions also serve to make it almost, impossible for one to indulge in the old luxury of plurality of wives.

Prior to the present social revolution in Turkey, every woman was obliged to veil herself from all except her father, brother and husband. If a man, either Turk or foreigner, entered the sacred precints of the harem, he usually paid with his life, while the master also had the right to kill his unfaithful wife or concu-

Only three foreigners, an American, a Britisher and a Frenchman, are known to have entered a real harem when it was occupied, and they were disguised as Turks and spoke the Turkish language. By posing as governmnet representatives, they escaped the usual penalty.

Any departure from the rules of conduct in the harems were severely punished by the eunuchs, who maintained security of the places and who were euphemistically called "Masters of the Maidens," or "Chiefs of the Abodes of Felicity."

While Sultan Mohammed VI. had only four legal wives he had at his disposal several hundred "ikbals." or favorites. Sultan Abdul Hamid was said to have had 1.000 wives in his harem.

Madam Edibe Halliday Hanoum Bey. a Turkish woman trained in the American Girls' College at Constantinople, was one of the first to agitate a change in the status of Moslem women, insisting that the system was wholly inconsistent with any high

ideal of womanhood. Abandonment of the harem has been noted as Turkey's most radical step in its transition from an Oriental state to a modern Western country.

Where Saul Died

BIBLICAL DISCOVERIES NEAR THE JORDAN.

PHILADELPHIA-One of the most interesting discoveries of recent years is made known in the announcement of the University of Pennsylvania that the University's Palestine expedition has uncovered an ancient Philistine stronghold at the top of the hill of Beth-Shan, near the Jordan. the wall on which Saul's body was suspended after his death, and possibly even the Temple in which, according to the first book of Samuel. Saul's armour was placed.

The hill has been the strategic point of militady operations throughout history, and the excavations , which have been going on steadily for two seasons have penetrated strata indicating man superimposed civilizations including the Greek, Roman, and Christian periods the era of the Crusaders. and so on.

Beneath these have been found the debris of the fortifications of Old Testament fame. These, however, were not built by the Philistines, but at an earlier period by Egyptians who under Ramese II. erected a monument containing the only known record outside the Bible of the sojourn of the Hebrew in Egypt.

Nine-Year-Old **Boy Murdered His** Foster Mother

PORTLAND, Oregon, Dec. 4-A nine year old boy shot and killed his foster mother because some beans happened to be burned, he confessed to deputy sheriffs yesterday. The boy is Frank Thomas, negro, adopted son of Oliver F. Thomas, negro, proprietor of a

tavern in the outskirts of Portland. The boy said he was angered because Mrs. Thomas called him a liar. He had reported to her that the beans, being cooked on the kitchen stove were all right. Soon afterwards she smelled the beans burning and reproached the boy.
