Parry Sound District.

The numerous lakes, rivers and springs, together with the adaptability of its soil for pasturage purposes, mark this place as the coming ranching ground of the Province.

Already the country has reaped an immense harvest from the pinery of its torests, but its resources in that line are far from being exhausted. The maple, beech, black birch, hemlock, tamarack and spruce are abundant in many places. At South River last winter an American firm secured over 6,000 cords of pulp wood.
