

THE GREAT SUEZ CANAL

TO GO THROUGH IT IS THE JOURNEY OF ALL JOURNEYS.

A Sail to Which All Tourists Look Forward With Delight-A Trooper in the Twilight-A Bit of Suez-Near Ismailia -A Landscape Mirage,

old Malabar, has already gone, and will be followed at fortnightly intervals by the Victoria, the Britannia, and the Dilwara, the stately vessels that have been chartered from the Peninsular and Oriental and British India companies for transport service, and on the passengers steamers of



A TROOPER IN THE TWILIGHT.


both of these leading lines, as well as on the smaller ones, berths for several weeks

to come will be at a premium. Whether one embarks at the Albert docks or avoids the terrors of "the bay" by going overland to Marseilles, Brindisi, or Naples, there is no stage of the voyage more anticipated or discussed than the Suez canal. Down the iron-bound coast of Spain, where the steaming surf, even on a calm September morning, beats in angry foam, one looks with mournful awe on the hungry waves which play over the wreckage of the Serpent and the Roumania, and a few are well enough read in the annals of Portuguese piracy to give more than a passing look to the Berlings and their light. Gibraltar, massive and imposing as it towers out with its aggressive fortifications, may be passed at night; Malta, again, may be too far off to discern more than haze-hung violet outlines, but the moment that the lights of Damietta have flashed out of the darkness, or the first glimpses of Port Said have been reported from the bridge, everyone is on the alert, and those going to India for the first time feel that they have really come to the stage "where the strange roads go down." And if this has been reached after dark, there is the weird bustle of coaling, when glowing braziers cast flickering shadows upon the black-laden lighters, and scantily clad, dusky "coalies" move over the ship's side like an unending procession of

gnomes. Then as the anchor chain is drawn up and we are again under way we leave breakfast, the comparison of our bargains in Greek lace and gold-braided zouaves, or the final rounds of our great "bull" tournament, equally to see the approach to the great waterway that has revolutionized the carrying trade of the world. The canal pilot is on board, the captain and the chief officer are deep in technical discussion, and we stand in little knots, not quite willing perhaps to say it, but a trifle sorry in our minds that no splendid monument of masonry and no formalities of opening locks or raising barriers should mark the entrance to De Lesseps' triumphant work. Two huge dredgers are ceaselessly at work removing sand and silt; that is all, and then before us stretches a long silvery streak which recedes into dim perspective, while yellow sand is all that there is to be

seen on either side. Just at first the banks are very low and there is nothing to hide the monotonous landscape of tawny-colored waste on both hands. Should atmospheric conditions be favorable one sees the oft-described mirage, and it seems like distrusting one's own eyes to believe, on the faith of the captain or some experienced travelor, that the grass and trees, the water and cloud, are but reflections. There are travelers who profess, as Oscar Wilde did with the Atlantic, to find the canal "disappointing." What they expected it to be like is not very easy to imagine, but the absence of any sight or sign of man's handiwork is in itself impressive. Only at intervals on the shores are stations, whence signals are conveyed to the ships if necessary; while a kindly officer off duty tells that the single ball just hoisted as we approach means "go ahead," the corresponding injunction after dark being given by a red and a yellow light. Once in a way, too, we pass the trim bungalow of a resident engineer, where constant care keeps a few flowers alive, and spotless blinds and curtains

seem a housewifely pride. Thus the day passes on, and regularly



Some of the minor regulations read very curiously, and it is expressly forbidden to "pick up without the direct intervention of the company's agents anything that may have fallen into the water." I have never heard whether any extremely literal commander has obeyed this injunction in the event of a man overboard, but the authorized procedure is that "should any material of whatever kind fall overboard, the circumstances are to be immediately made known to the pilot, who is instructed to submit such information to the agent at the nearest station." The burial of dead bodies, human or otherwise, in the banks of the canal is also probibited, and a special circular on this subject was recently addressed to shipmasters, judging from which sepulture in such fashion appears to

have been far from infrequent. Meantime it has grown dusk. We have passed Ismailia, with its heavy-sailed craft. Darkness is coming down, and on the shores we see patient caravans of camels halted for the night. The noisy throb of the dynamo resounds through the ship, and the electric projector lamp fixed in her bows, as close to the water line as possible, and throwing a light at least 1,200 yards ahead, has flashed into brilliancy. Besides this another electric lamp and shade must be fixed high above the upper deck. But of the effects of these on board we see little, and to realize what they are we must wait till we have to "tie up" to let another ship pass us, or have reached a wider part, when both "slow down" to go

The most recent regulations have laid it down that, to obviate the blinding glare, which often resulted in miscalculation of distance, the beam of light from the projector shall be divided into two portions, by which the light falls chiefly upon the banks and sides of the channel, while no rays fall on the approaching ship, whose masthead light looms out distinctly. Then again, if the captain is really nice, he may again show a special favor and allow a highly honored passenger to see this effect from the bridge. It is one of the strangest and uncanniest pictures to be imagined, and would be the despair of an artist in

A stone is exaggerated into some antediluvian saurian, a bunch of scrub has become a forest of branching white coral, a group of reeds at the water's edge wave like immense feather fans. In a few moments we are past one another and the scene has faded magically into darkness and the vision of an enchanted river is gone till another vessel bears down, and it comes again. Then morning finds us at Suez, where delicious fresh fish and grapes are brought on board, and in a few hours we realize that we are well in the Red Sea.

BALLAD OF THE DRUM.

Where Bobby Burns Composed the Poem Destined to Be So Famous. Where will the reader find this soldiers song once brawly chorused by the laddies of the Highland regiments during the Peninsular and Waterloo campaigns? The answer is plain. In the year 1785 Robert Burns composed his dramatic poem, consisting of a series of songs and recitations, entitled the "Jolly Beggars." It will be recalled that one Possie Nansie kept a public house in Mauchline, which was nightly frequented by all the vagrant fraternity of the town. Burns, passing the house one night, was attracted by the sounds of mirth and revelry issuing from the interior, and on entering was cordially welcomed by the motley tavern crew to their nilarious orgies. Those he happily depicted, or rather idealized in verse, in "The Jolly Beggars." The songs of his poem, especially that known as "The Drum" (which popularly derived its name from the concluding words of the last line of each stanza), were at once caught up by the people and chanted everywhere. The air to which the words of "The Drum" were adapted by the poet was that of an old marching song long a favorite with the British soldiers. Gen. Hamilton must have often read and heard this ballad, and hence in a measure made the lines his

Long-Distance Photography. Now that Dr. Miethe, the scientific German photographer, has invented a teloscopic camera, long-distance photography, that chimera of the "darkroom," seems absolutely assured. The objective of this new photographic wonder consists of a convex lens of considerable length of focus and a concave lens of much shorter range. These glasses are placed a certain distance apart, depending on the difference of the two foci. By the laws of optics, this arrangement projects an inverted image of the object for which it is set a long distance from the further end of the lenses.
