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AILSA CRAIG MAN
LOSES A FOOT

Deliberately Walks Before a Moving Train, But Escapes With His Life.

Our Ailsa Craig special correspondent gives the following details of a sad accident to which the Advertiser has already made brief reference:

The eastbound mixed G. T. R. train arrived at Forest Thursday evening, about 5:30, and having to take up a car, stopped before reaching the station. Becoming impatient at the delay, Mr. N. Gillies, a building mover of Ailsa Craig, decided to walk the remaining distance, and started down the track, while the engine was shunting, but, hearing the whistle repeatedly blown to warn him, walked in the space north of the south track. He did not long continue that course, and on the engine approaching he evidently stepped in front of it in an effort to reach the other side, and before the horrified spectators really knew what had happened, the unfortunate man was being mercilessly dragged along by the left foot, which had been caught by the engine, and being ground and crushed. Willing hands soon conveyed the injured man to the Franklin House, where his foot was amputated at the ankle by Drs. Campbell, Marshall, Blain, Hubbard and Totten, and everything done to make the patient comfortable. He is progressing nicely. His family were speedily communicated with, and are now with him. The injured man also sustained a
