EASY FOR ST. MARYS.

By yesterday's game of lacrosse between the teams of St. Marys and London, the occupants of the grand stand as well as the members of the local team, became finally convinced that the visitors knew a thing or two about this speedy and fascinating sport. Although there were several extenuating circumstances that would tend to lessen the sting of defeat, a full quota of credit must be given to the clever stick-handlers from the stone town. Their combination work, in several instances, was superb. They caught and passed with rapidity, and with accurate judgment. In this they signally outclassed the boys who were striving to tally on the local side. The result of this evident superiority was that when time was called the score stood 7 to 1 with the locals owing the unit. London notched a goal a few minutes after the game started, and their consequent elation apparently had a bad effect. Although they lacked combination work entirely, they often managed to get the ball within shooting distance, but their shots were always neatly and effectively turned aside by Farr.
