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FOREIGN AMBASSADORS VISIT KING ED-

ward at Marlborough House.
London, March 18.—United States Ambassador Choate and the other ambassadors and ministers to Great Britain presented their credentials to King Edward at Marlborough House at noon today.
Each member of the diplomatic corps arrived in a royal carriage drawn by two horses, and were attended by three royal servants attired in long scarlet cloaks. All the diplomats wore levee dress with orders and decorations, with the exception of Ambassador Choate, who wore ordinary evening dress.
The foreign secretary, Lord Lansdowne, introduced the visitors to the King, who was attired in a field-marshal's uniform.
CABLE PROJECT BETWEEN ENGLAND AND CANADA.
London, March 17.—The Daily Mail publishes an interview this morning, with Mr. Wm. Mulock, the Canadian postmaster-general, regarding his cable project of a direct and exclusive connection between England and Canada at half the present rates. Mr. Mulock explains that he has in view the development of the Anglo-Canadian commerce and asserts that "the high American tariff almost prohibits any profitable trade with the United States for Canadian exports."
BIG GIFT TO BIRMINGHAM.
London, March 18.—Mr. George Cadbury, the chocolate manufacturer, has presented to the city of Birmingham an estate of 416 acres, valued at £180,000, upon which to build houses for the working classes.
DOINGS OF ROYALTY.
Copenhagen, March 18.—Dowager Empress Marie of Russia will arrive here tomorrow, and will remain until after the celebration of the 53rd anniversary of the birth of her father King Christian IX.

PROSPECTS ARE HOPEFUL!

That Peace May Soon Be Established in South Africa.

Boer Commanders Discussing a General Surrender--

The Notorious Erasmus a Prisoner--Boer Convoy Captured--More Troops Leave England.

DEWEET'S COMMANDO BROKEN.

London, Monday, March 18.—A Cape Town dispatch, dated Sunday, says: Gen. Dewet's commando has been broken up at Senekal, Orange River Colony.

PEACE PROSPECTS HOPEFUL.

A Pretoria dispatch of Sunday says: The prospects of peace are still considered hopeful.

BOER LOSSES.

The Boer losses last month were 160 killed and 400 wounded and 1,000 captured and surrendered.

GENERAL SURRENDER DIS-

CUSSSED.
London, March 17.—A special dispatch from Standerton says the Boers are massing at the station on the Delagoa line, and the leaders are conferring daily at each station and also at Pietersburg. Nothing has transpired except that the fate of the Boers who have surrendered is one of the subjects of discussion. The leaders are in communication on the subject of a general surrender with the Boer committee at Amsterdam. It is stated that the manufacture of ammunition is proceeding vigorously.

LOOTED BY BOERS.

Linton, Cape Colony, Friday, March 15.—The Boers passed through here yesterday morning. They looted the stores, seized forage, and burned what wheat they could not carry off.

ERASMUS A PRISONER.

London, March 16.—A dispatch from Gen. Kitchener dated Pretoria, March 15, announces that the notorious Abel Erasmus, of Lydenburg, has been brought in with his family, by Col. Park's column.

CAN'T PARDON DEWET.

London, March 16.—Whatever the result of the peace negotiations between Gen. Kitchener and Gen. Botha, it is tolerably certain that the rumors of the inclusion of Gen. Dewet in any form of amnesty are not based on fact. Gen. Kitchener's views of the Boer leader are not known in Parliament, but if the war office is consulted the officials there would rather see Dewet killed in action than taken alive. One of the officials responsible for the execution of the affairs of the army said to a press representative: "I cannot see how Kitchener can possibly accept Dewet's surrender. If he ever gets him he will be obliged to try him for his recent alleged murders of prisoners. I have no doubt that the ver-

SIXTY MEN PERISH

Terrible Fire in a Turpentine Camp—Fired Out of Revenge.

Mobile, Ala., March 15.—News has just reached here of the burning of a big turpentine camp, across the bay, in Baldwin county, at an early hour this morning. Sixty persons, mostly negroes, are supposed to have perished in the fire. So far as is known, only one man survived, and he is so badly burned that it is only with great difficulty that he could tell of his fearful experience after reaching here. The survivor is Frank C. Pressler, a white cutter, who was employed in the camp.

Pressler is of the opinion that the fire was started by three negroes who were fired out of the camp yesterday morning. They were roughly handled before being allowed to leave and he thinks they set fire to the woods for revenge. The negroes are not known here, but Pressler furnished a good description of them and a posse has gone to Baldwin county to look for them.

Forty-five of the men who are thought to have perished are negroes.
