—The Westminster roller rink will be
open to-morrow night.

—Mr. James O'Shea, R.A., of Kingston,
is visiting his friend, Mr. L. W. Burke, of
this city.

—One hundred tons of cheese passed
through here yesterday on the C. P. R.
from Perth to the World's Fair.

—The Montreal Witness says of Miss
Phelps: There is a vivacity and clearness
of logic, a force and directness of argument,
which reaches the dullest listener.

—Mr. A. E. Franklin, who has been at-
tending the medical department of the
Western University here for three years,
left yesterday on a visit to his home in
Brookville.

—Ex-Mayor Taylor, of this city, has
received an invitation to take a seat on the
platform at the Toronto demonstration in
honour of Mr. D'Alton McCarthy, M.P., to-
morrow night.

—Grand great spring sale of horses
takes place to-morrow and Thursday
at the Thompson House stables, when all
classes will be offered. This is a great
opportunity for those wanting a good
horse.

—Bro. Joseph Hook was made the
recipient of a valuable past president's
jewel at the regular meeting of Piquet
Lodge, O. O. F., last evening. Past Presi-
dent Simmons made the presentation on
behalf of the lodge.

—The London Covered Rink Company
(Limited) held their annual meeting last
evening. The financial statement showed
that after paying all expenses and \$150 on
the mortgage, there was a cash balance in
the treasury of \$127.00.

—Mrs. Holmes, of this city, the well-
known head of the famous Holman Com-
pany, is in New York. Mr. Wm. H. Crane,
the celebrated comedian, whom she trained
for the stage, is to give her a benefit at the
Star Theatre there on April 25 and a
splendid bill is being arranged.

—The Prince of Wales sent an order
through his bankers for \$1,500 worth of
flowers to be used in decorating St.
George's Church, New York, on Easter
Day. The Prince has long been an ad-
mirer of the pastor, Dr. Rainford, with
whom many of London's citizens are well
acquainted.

—Crowds were seen to-day in front of
the London Auction Rooms examining the
magnificent pair of elk horns as well as the
polished and unpolished buffalo horns.
Without exception these are the finest pair
of horns ever seen here. They were found
by Mr. Paisley on his ranch, near the
mountains, N. W. T.

—"It would look as if the last screw was
put on Sunday," said a policeman to an
ADVERTISER reporter yesterday. "Hitherto
to once in fourteen weeks two policemen
has been allowed the privilege of attend-
ing church, but yesterday even that was
denied the two men whose turn it was. I
don't know whether there is a prepender-
ence of crime in this fair city of ours on
not on the Sabbath day, but one thing I do
know, and that is that the men would like
the privilege of attending church once in a
while anyway."

—Ald. J. W. Jones, auctioneer, sold
three general stocks at his rooms yester-
day for unusually high prices. That of D.
Simpson, of Alvin, valued at \$10,000, \$1,
was purchased by Hennessy & Co., of To-
ronto, at 7 1/2 cents on the dollar. Merner
& Co., of Newmarket, bought the stock of
Heitman & Gaiser, of Shipka, valued at
\$2,451.50, at 60 cents on the dollar, and
Thomas Ray, of Drayton, paid 7 1/2 cents
on the dollar for the stock of Cross & Norris,
of Drayton, valued at \$2,496.71.

—Mr. Charles Frohm's new comedy
success called "Gloriana," will be pre-
sented for the first time in this city at the
Grand next Monday. The author is James
Mortimer. The comedy has lately com-
pleted a run of 150 performances in New
York City. A cast of unusual excellence,
including many old favorites and some new
faces, will present the play, among them
being Messrs. Merron, Helen Holland,
Tillie Barnum, Messrs. George Barnum,
William Norris, Eugene F. Eberle, Charles
E. Warren, Charles Drake, John Allen,
G. C. Phillips, Jacques Martin and others.

—Mr. W. A. Mackay, who has been
studying at Knox College, Toronto, dur-
ing the term just closed, has returned to
the city. At the examination held recently,
Mr. Mackay distinguished himself in a
most creditable manner, making a high
percentage in all subjects. He is now en-
gaged for the summer months to work
under the London Free Press, and
yesterday occupied the pupils of
Delaware at both services. It was ex-
pected that he would spend the summer in
the Northwest mission fields, but on ac-
count of ill-health he had to abandon that
plan. Mr. Mackay was a former employe
of the ADVERTISER.

Sudden Death at Belmont.
Neil McMillan, a Scotchman, of about 55
years of age, was found dead in Neil
Taylor's bush, con. 14, Yarmouth, yester-
day. The body was taken to Belmont. It
is not known yet whether death was due
to natural causes or not. Deceased was a
bushman who did odd jobs for farmers
in that locality. He took dinner with Mr.
Taylor, of Belmont, on Monday. That
was the last seen of him alive.

"The Leavenworth Case."
The attraction at the Grand last evening
was the presentation of the celebrated
dramatic version of "The Leavenworth
Case," written by the author, Anna
Katharine Green. It is a peculiar play.
The plot is plain to the spectator, but in
unravelling the different links of evidence
gained by the detective and the several
clues advanced by him, before he accuses
the assassin his suspects, some finished pieces
of acting are developed. In the portrayal of
Harwell, Mr. Charles Rolfe displayed
masterly talent, stamping him as one of the

leading actors of the day. Excellent sup-
port is rendered by the different members
of the company, who each display com-
mendable efficiency.

Japan and Its Customs.
Rev. T. C. Cocking, who has labored for
six years as a missionary in Japan, and who
recently returned, delivered an interesting
and instructive lecture in the East End
Hall last night, illustrated by limelight
views. There was a large audience
present. Mr. Cocking explained the
various views, which represent the Japanese
customs, famous buildings and temples and
the condition of the country after the
earthquakes of a year or so ago. At the
conclusion of the lecture Mr. Cocking gave
an example of a service conducted in the
Buddhist temples of Japan.

The Seventh Annual Drill.
The Seventh Fusiliers turned out 200
strong at the opening of their annual drill
in the drill shed last evening. Lieut.-Col.
Pyne was in command and the other
officers present were Major Hayes, Capt.
Moore and Dawson, and Lieuts. Magee,
Fitzgerald, Graham, Taylor and Graves.
The men were put through several move-
ments and acquitted themselves creditably,
showing that they had forgotten very little
of their drill since last year. The men
hope that during this summer they will be
drilled more in the open air instead of in
the shed.

A Spoiled Sensation.
Some of the morning papers published a
dispatch from Homestead, Pa., that was
harrowing in its details. The story was
that two detectives from Toronto, while
hunting for a lost hearse, found her in Mrs.
Ann Barr, of that town, but also found that
her husband was her long lost brother, the
two having been separated in childhood
and having met and loved without discover-
ing the identity of one another. The
city detective force here knows nothing of
the matter, while inquiry at the private de-
tective agencies elicited only the informa-
tion from Detective Newhall, that he had
seen the same story in print over two
months ago. Thus is another sensation
spoiled!—[Saturday's Toronto News.

Bonusing Manufacturers.
The "freedom of the city" in a gold box
is occasionally presented to very distin-
guished men in the old country as a crow-
ning mark of appreciation of the services
they have rendered to the public. But this
mark of honor, whatever it may have been
in times past, is now chiefly ornamental. It
carries with it no immunity from taxation,
and the holder of it has scarcely any real
advantages which the ordinary citizen does
not possess. It seems, however, to be the
coming fashion for commercial corpora-
tions, whether in embryo or in full bloom,
to ask for a "freedom of the city" of a much
more real and tangible kind. There have
been recent instances of this. Free land,
bonuses and exemption from taxation for
ever, are spoken of as possibilities. What-
ever may be the desirability of giving away
land which is at present doing nothing and
earning nothing for the city, it should be
borne in mind that this can be done only
by a vote of the duly qualified citizens.

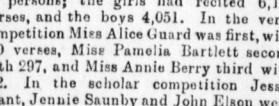
With regard to bonuses, it should be re-
membered that bonuses cannot be given.
There formerly existed a clause in the
Municipal Act empowering municipalities
to give bonuses. Sub-section 10, section
479 of the Municipal Act, R. S. O., 1887,
gave this power. But, as will be found by
a reference to the statutes for 1892, section
28 of the Municipal Amendment Act says
that the provision is repealed. There can
therefore be no bonuses. As to exemption
from taxation forever, a two-thirds vote
of the council can give ten years' exemp-
tion, and after this the same can be re-
newed for ten years, but when the twenty
years have expired there is the end of it.
A little attention should be paid to these
provisions of the law.—[Toronto Mail.

A HAPPY GATHERING.
Anniversary of the London West Meth-
odist Sunday School—Satisfactory
Reports and a Fine
Programme.

The anniversary of the London West
Methodist Sunday school was cele-
brated last evening by an entertainment
and the presentation of the annual reports.
The audience was large and the programme
deserved the attendance. Mr. C. E. Arm-
strong presided. The yearly report as
read by the secretary, R. Donaghy,
showed increased prosperity. They had 171
pupils on the roll—89 girls and 82 boys,
with an average attendance of 64 and 58 respec-
tively. They had also average attendance 15
teachers and 8 officers; had been visited by
85 persons; the girls had recited 6,159
verses, and the boys 4,051. In the verse
competition Miss Alice Guard was first, with
670 verses, Miss Pamela Bartlett second
with 597, and Miss Annie Berry third with
592. In the scholar competition Jessie
Grant, Jennie Sumby and John Elson were
successful. Harry and Miss Bella Currie
were complimented on their leadership of
the school choir, and reference was made
to the retirement of Mr. Wm. Gibson from
the superintendency after four years' splen-
did service. The officers of the school are:
Superintendent, Charles Gillespie; assis-
tant, James Elson; secretary, R. Donaghy;
assistant, Harry Currie; treasurer, Miss
Eliza Woodward; librarian, McRae Elson;
assistant, Arthur Jeffries; organist, Miss
Bella Currie.

The programme comprised an impromptu
speech by Robert Greene; song, Mrs. (Rev.)
Cassidy; reading, Miss Florence Ware;
violin selections, Miss Patterson; trio,
Messrs. Harry Currie, McRae Elson and
Charles Berry; fan drill, sixteen young
ladies from the Congregational Church,
under the management of Miss Greenway;
recitation, Mr. A. Killip; solo,
Harry Currie; dramatic exercise,
"Jesus Is Mine," Misses Woodward,
Donovan, Graham and Grant; duet,
in Japanese language, Mesdames (Rev.)
Cassidy and (Rev.) Cocking; quartet,
Messrs Currie and Sharp and Messrs
Currie and Berry. The next credit is due to
the committee—Mesdames Wm. Gibson and
Cooper, Misses Currie and Calver and Mr.
H. Currie, the leader of the Sabbath school
choir. The children have their treat to-
night, for which an equally good programme
has been provided.
