Canada's New Governor.

LONDON, June 1.—The Earl of Aberdeen stated today that he would probably start for Canada in August next to assume the duties of Governor-General, but that much would depend upon such arrangements as the Earl of Derby should see fit to make.

PARIS, June 1.—In his argument before the Bering Sea tribunal of arbitration today Sir Richard Webster renewed his analysis of the different treaties respecting seals.

A Millionaire Bull-Fighter.

MADRID, June 1.—La Garitjo, the king of bull-fighters, made his last public appearance today. Besides the fee of 50,000 francs he received half the gate receipts, which were approximately 150,000. More than 14,000 persons were present. All the bulls were from the herd of the Duke of Veragua, who breeds the fiercest fighters in Spain.

In a Bad Way.

ROME, June 1.—In the Senate yesterday Signor Saracco, the reporter of the Pensionis Bill, made a scathing speech, setting forth the financial fallacies of the measure. He gave figures intended to show that the adoption of the bill would make it necessary to raise the military forces of the country or to impose an additional taxation to the amount of 80,000,000 lire upon the people. The Minister of the Treasury denied that the finances of the Government were in the desperate condition described, but it is the general opinion that as a result of Signor Saracco's attack the rejection of the Pensionis Bill is assured.

The Home Rule Bill.

LONDON, June 1.—In the House of Commons today Mr. Labouchere addressed a series of questions to the Government with the view of obtaining definite information as to whether the Foreign Office had authorized Sir Gerald Portal to proclaim a British protectorate in Uganda.

Mr. Gladstone's Motion.

Sir Edward Grey in reply, referred Mr. Labouchere to the published instructions given to Sir Gerald Portal when he went on his mission.

Sir Arnold Forster (Liberal Unionist) made a motion to amend in order to obtain an opportunity for debate on the growth of crime in the counties of Kerry and Limerick, Ireland.

The result of the motion by a vote of 241 to 203. The House then went into committee on the Home Rule Bill.

Mr. Gladstone's Motion.

Mr. Gladstone's motion was adopted. He proposed to amend the bill so as to give the Irish authorities all Irish police except the local forces under direct official control.

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Late Canadian News

A Michigan Central Employee Crushed to Death—Thirty Prisoners at Kingston Go Free This Month.

Archbishop Walsh, of Toronto, is the guest of Archbishop Cleary, Kingston.

The firm of Regan, White & Co., wholesale grocers, Montreal, assigned. Liabilities about \$30,000.

This month the sentences of 30 prisoners in the Kingston Penitentiary will expire. Nearly all Canadian crooks are steering for Chicago.

Burglars broke into D. K. McArthur's store at Hopville, nine miles from Dundas, Wednesday morning, and stole \$135 from the safe.

It is stated that the Infanta Eulalia of Spain will come down the St. Lawrence river in June and visit Montreal on her way to the Saguenay.

The Trades and Labor Congress, of Canada will hold its annual convention in Montreal next September. Delegates will be present from every part of the Dominion.

Messrs. Crossley and Hunter had arranged to close their evangelistic services in Napawan Tuesday night, but so wondrous has been the work that no halt could be allowed. Mr. Crossley will remain to the end of the week. The thank offering Tuesday night reached \$380.

For the first time Corpus Christi was not observed on Thursday in the Government departments as a holiday. By an act introduced last session it was provided that Corpus Christi, Annunciation and St. Peter and St. Paul should be days of statutory holidays in the Province of Quebec.

Alfred Henry Wilson, trader, Toronto, doing business alone as "Wilson & Frost," has assigned. Liabilities secured, \$81,600; unsecured, \$121,914.35. The assets consist mainly of real estate in various parts of the city, value estimated at about \$15,000.

The Manchester Union, H. A. Collins, of Manchester, Ont., O. O. P., met with a great reception at Trenton on Thursday. The Trenton brethren, with about 400 visiting brethren, after passing through the principal streets, repaired to the opera house and presented the grand master with an address.

Mr. Edward Kirstein and Miss Maggie Montague were driving through Carleton Place Tuesday evening, when the horses became unmanageable. The carriage was upset and Mr. Kirstein was thrown out with such violence that he died four hours afterwards. One of Miss Montague's arms was broken.

Farmers in the vicinity of Renfrew are after a circus manager for tricks played on them. A couple of weeks ago the agents advertised that the circus would buy 100 horses. The result was that every farmer who had a spare horse was on hand. The whole thing proved to be a "snake" dress.

A dispatch from International Bridge, Ont., says: John Watts, employed as a laborer in the Michigan Central Railway yards at Victoria, was accidentally killed Thursday morning by being run over by several cars. Deceased was 65 years of age. He leaves a wife and seven children.

Frank Peters, the Italian who is under arrest in Buffalo charged with murdering his wife, is well known in Ottawa, and has an unenviable reputation. Some years ago, when he kept a peanut and confectionery stand on Rideau street, he beat and fatally injured Robert Elliot, who with a companion chafed him and took some peanuts from his stand. He is also credited with other crimes.

Thos. O'Neill, a wood dealer on Hugheson street, Hamilton, slipped from a load of cordwood Thursday and fell on his head, breaking his neck.

A young man named Carrier from St. Thomas D'Alfred was instantly killed by being run over by a car loaded with lumber at the Hawkesbury lumber mills.

The Ottawa Citizen, commenting on the feeble condition of the Kingston Macdonald memorial fund, moralizes that "the neglect of the memory of great men is proverbial."

There are about 500,000 salmon fry at the Ottawa fish hatchery to be distributed, and the officers are busy disposing of them. Consignments have been sent to various waters.

Toronto's municipal debt is growing to colossal proportions. The city's obligations will soon reach \$20,000,000, and that is far less than a mortgage to be carried comfortably.

John Watts, 65 years of age, and employed in the Michigan Central Railway yard at Victoria, Ont., was run over by several cars Thursday, and received horrible injuries, which were speedily fatal.

James Conner, M.P.P. for Western Alberta, is being pressed to run for the Federal House in the next general elections for the Nipissing district, the new constituency created by the Redistribution Bill.

The Kingston City Council has passed a resolution of congratulation to City Clerk Michael Flanagan on the completion of 50 years' service in the corporation, granted \$500 towards a testimonial, and gave him six months' leave of absence.

Liberal conventions in Quebec for the appointment of delegates to the national convention are announced as follows: Richelieu, at Sorel, on June 3; LaSalle, at Papineauville, on June 3; Chambly, at Longueuil, on June 9, and Terrebonne, at St. Jerome, on June 8.

A Big Blaze.

NEW YORK, June 2.—J. B. & J. M. Cornell's iron works, covering almost the entire block between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets and Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, were burned last night. Loss estimated at \$700,000.

Many Bank Failures.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 2.—Controlled by the panic, a bank with a capital of \$6,150,000, has failed, as against seven national banks, with a capital of \$625,000 for the corresponding period of 1892.

The Journal of Commerce and the Daily Commercial Bulletin, of New York city, have been consolidated under one management.

There is little doubt now that Count Leo Tolstoi will visit America and the Chicago World's Fair during the latter part of this summer.

Princess Eulalia went to the races at the famous Morris Park track, New York, on Thursday. In the evening the princess and the prince and suite dined with White-law Reid at his residence.

The marriage of Miss Marion Phelps, daughter of Wm. Walter Phelps, late Minister of the United States in Berlin, to Dr. C. Von Rottemburg, was solemnized Thursday at the residence of Mr. Phelps, Berlin.

While the Forty-Seventh (New York) Regiment was standing at the corner of Bedford avenue and South Eighth street, Brooklyn, waiting for the memorial day parade to start, Wm. L. Osborne, a member of the band, dropped dead from heart disease. He was 54 years of age.

The Russian Corvette Nika was totally wrecked on the Korean coast, on May 5. Nine lives were lost.

At Brainerd, Minn., the car shops of the Northern Pacific Railway were burned Thursday. Loss \$25,000.

At Columbus, O., Thursday Ralph Drake shot and killed Mrs. Ida Ward and then put a bullet into his own head and will die.

Widow Thomas and her 13-year-old daughter, near Forest City, Ark., were killed during a cyclone Wednesday. Their house was demolished.

A severe earthquake was felt at Guayaquil, Ecuador, on Sunday evening. Many houses were damaged and three prisoners were killed in the wreck of the jail.

During the heavy thunderstorm Wednesday, Perry Smith, of Squashanna, Ga., was struck by lightning and instantly killed while sitting in the doorway of his barn.

It is stated that Prof. Briggs will go right on at the Union Seminary just as if nothing had happened, and he will be sustained by the board of directors and the members of the faculty of the institution.

Reports received at Hope, Ark., show that thousands of acres of cotton are literally swept away. Fences are gone and wrecked trees cover the fields, giving no chance to replant. Many persons have been injured and some killed.

Died With a Glass in His Hand.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Bernard Connerly, 33 years old, of 135 Steuben street, Jersey City, a "longshoreman" employed at the Union Line docks, went into Richard McMillan's saloon, 349 Henderson street, on Tuesday and asked for a glass of ale.

He was in the act of drinking when he suddenly fell backward to the floor. The bartender went to his aid, but Connerly expired within a few minutes.

After the dedication services were over the grand delegates were banqueted at the Korbey House. There was a large number of visiting members present from different parts of the country, and everything passed off most successfully.

Opening Day—Rev. Dr. Aylesworth Elected President.

Rev. G. W. Henderson Made Secretary on the First Ballot.

Regular Committees Chosen and Interesting Reports Submitted.

FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION.

SARINIA, June 1.—The Conference began its sessions in the Central Methodist Church at 9 a.m. The president, Rev. J. G. Scott, was in the chair and conducted the Conference prayer meeting, which closed at 10 a.m.

The secretary of the Conference, Rev. W. J. Ford, LL.B., then read the lists of the lay representatives to this annual Conference. The roll being called, 90 ministers and 22 laymen answered to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election of president.

On the first ballot Dr. Aylesworth received 43 votes, Rev. W. W. Shepherd 39, Rev. J. Leary 32, Rev. A. L. Russell 8, Rev. J. Whiting 6, Dr. Antiff 4.

Second ballot—Dr. Aylesworth 64, J. Leary 40, W. W. Shepherd 44.

Third ballot—Dr. Aylesworth 75, J. Leary 29, W. W. Shepherd 45.

Fourth ballot—Dr. Aylesworth 90, J. Leary 16, W. W. Shepherd 47.

Dr. Aylesworth was declared elected president, having a majority of the votes.

The retiring president, in a few appropriate remarks, introduced the president-elect, Dr. Aylesworth, who was heartily received and made a very happy address.

Rev. G. W. Henderson was elected secretary on the first ballot.

Rev. Dr. Aylesworth introduced a resolution expressing appreciation of the efficient services of the retiring president, which was adopted unanimously.

The Conference then adjourned to meet at 2 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference reassembled at 2 p.m., Rev. Dr. Aylesworth in the chair. The minutes of the morning session were read and confirmed.

On nomination of the secretary Rev. S. J. Allen and W. H. McCutcheon were appointed assistant secretaries and Rev. G. H. Thompson, general secretary.

The committee appointed to consider the case of Rev. T. L. McCutcheon, who during the year had left the parsonage at Waukegan and removed to Forest, reported that in their judgment he was at fault in this matter, and recommended that he be admonished by the president, which recommendation was sustained by the Conference.

The committee on Conference relations recommended that Rev. W. Bryers, T. Cobb and W. W. Edwards be superannuated. Indorsed by the Conference.

The committee appointed by the president to consider the case of Rev. T. H. Down reported that the committee of the Aymer district appointed to investigate the charges made against the moral character of Mr. Down was at fault in not having the evidence for the defense recorded in a disciplinary manner, the committee recommended that the matter be referred back again to this committee for further action.

The Conference then adjourned to meet at the call of the chair.

The following case came before Judge Meredith at Osceola Hall yesterday: Livingston vs. Sibbald.—Judgment on appeal by the plaintiff from an order of the junior local judge at London setting aside service of the writ of summons and statement of claim upon the defendants, who are resident out of the jurisdiction. The action was brought by the plaintiff, claiming to be a creditor of one of the defendants in respect of a promissory note, to set aside a conveyance of land in Ontario by that defendant to the other defendant. The learned judge holds that any cause of action upon the promissory note arose, and that the makers of it are domiciled ordinarily resident without the jurisdiction. But he holds that it is not necessary that the plaintiff should have judgment upon his claim as a creditor, and therefore the case is within rule 27
