## ANGLICANS NEED TO TAKE LESSONS

From Some of the Other Religious Bodies.

## CANON WELSH'S PLAIN WORDS

Mr. S. H. Blake Objects to a Certain Form of Prayer-Dr. Langtry Agrees With Him.

Toronto June 11.-The Anglican Synod is in an iconoclastic mood. Prayers were scarcely over this morning when Hon. S. H. Blake rose in his place and protested against the following clause: "Give us grace seriously to lay to heart the great dangers we are in by our unhappy divisions. Take away all hatred and prejudice and whatever else may hinder us from Godly union and concord."

Mr. Blake said the sentiment grated 11 o'clock a.m. on him, as there were no divisions nor hatred nor prejudice in the church. Dr. Langtry (presiding) said the objection voiced his own views. The prayer dated back to the time of William the Third over two centuries ago when there was cause for such appeals. It was decided to omit the objectionable phrases from the reading of the prayer at this meeting and to refer the question of striking it out

to the bishop. It was decided to meet in secret session this afternoon to discuss the work of the church which is not sat-

Ont., June 11.-Canon ure for a few moments, then climbed Toronto. Welch, of St. James' Cathedral, preached the synod sermon of the Toronto diocese last night, and it was announced in advance that he would discuss the remarks of Rev. Henry Kittson, of Montreal, who recently shocked public sentiment by calling Methodists religious parasites. Canon Welch, it was known, entirely objected to his brother Anglican's views, and although Mr. Kittsen was not mentioned by name, the whole burden of the sermon was directed against his atti-The canon preached from the "I am become all things to all men, that I might by all means save some." If figures told the truth the Church of England was not in the position it once was, and his conviction was that the prime cause of this was that the church had not followed the principle of the text. It was only by self-scrutiny that the church could regain its position. After all, numerical tests were not specially valuable This failure was chiefly due to a want of adaptability to new and untried

conditions. "We call ourselves," said the canon, Church of England in Canada, and there could not have been devised a more hapless name. It stamps us at once as emphatically not the church of the people of this land, and as we have adopted the name of the been none too successful in England." In England, the church had learned, at least, that in the cities and towns and was learning to adapt herself and her methods to the changing conditions of modern life, and it was just there in the towns and cities and not in the country that the strength of the Church of England lies today. Canon Welch then spoke of the need of doing as other churches do, and use the strength of the laity in aiding church work. KEEP TREES GROWING. Then it is desirable to get the trees to work as soon as possible. It is just as important that they should not be stunted, as it is important that young beef animals should not be stunted. A tree must be kept growing from the start. In order to effect this we must give good cultivation from the start, and not allow the tree to struggle for years until it begins bearing, and then give it cultivation. Cultivate thoroughly and often. Clean cultivation is not necessary from the beginning. For the first year or so you may put in any hoed crop such as corn. This will keep the ground constantly stirred. Corn will also provide the shade which the

As soon as the tops of the trees begin to spread, we may know that the roots are spreading also at about the Cultivation, however, must be kept up till nearly autumn in each year, and a cover crop sown then to be plowed under the following spring. Cultivation should not be continued

on into the autumn. If cultivation is kept up too long, the trees will tend to grow too much, with the result that the wood will be soft and will not ripen up. It is therefore necessary to stop cultivation about the latter part of July or the beginning of August, according to the latitude.

In growing apples you will probably notice that when the trees are in full leaf they take up a great deal of moisture from the soil, and that the soil dries on the surface. It is, therefore, necessary to cultivate the surface so as to retain as much of the moisture as possible. When the apple is growing the tree draws very heavily on the moisture of the soil. If the tree cannot get sufficient moisture small apples will result.

It is necessary to have the trees well pruned. This will allow the light and air to get in, so as to properly ripen and color the fruit. In pruning, during the early years you should avoid checking the growth. The object should be to direct the trees rather ney Pills and was completely cured. than check them. 
