FIXED PRICE AT \$200

Mr. Harvey May Yet Get Strip of

Land On Talbot Street.

The finance committee of the city

council yesterday afternoon decided to

recommend that the owner of the strip

of Talbot street between Oxford and

Sydenham street, and running along

the frontage owned by Mr. Alex Har-

vey, to sell to the city for the sum of

\$200. The strip is 32 feet wide, and

it cannot be used by the city, while to

sell it to any other person would mean

the shutting off the land into the back

age. If the land is sold to Mr. Harvey

he promises to erect at least three

houses on it. He desires the land for

the reason that his property falls back

in a hollow from the street, and he

cannot build from the present frontage

line unless he fills in the hollow. The
