MANY CONTRACTS WERE GIVEN OUT

No. 3 Committee Were Busy Last Night With Purchase of Supplies.

Opening tenders was the chief occupation of No. 3 committee last night. They were for the most part for supplies.

The contract for the coal supply was awarded to W. Heasman & Sons, on the following scale of prices: Hard coal, \$6 75; lump, \$6; relief coal, \$6 75; less than ton lots, \$7; long ton lots, \$7 50. There was no tender for the lowest tender.

The repairing and painting of the thirteen water carts was awarded to George Heasman for \$227 50. There was another tender, but it was somewhat higher than this.

Report Not Presented.

Ald. Moorhead called attention to the fact that the report of the inspector and engineer as to the nature of the repairs and whether or not they were needed, had not been given to the committee, as he had requested. He pointed out that he could not vote to award the tender if he were not convinced that they were not needed.

Ald. Garratt explained that the report had been given, but for some reason or other it had not been submitted to the committee. There was no doubt that the repairs were necessary.

Mayor Stevely moved that the contract be awarded to the lowest tender, provided that the report of the inspector showed that the repairs were necessary. This carried.

Ald. Fitzgerald objected to the purchase of a new cart, as he had been informed that there were two or three carts not in use now, as they were too heavy. As the specifications for the new cart were the same as for the other heavy carts he could see no necessity of purchasing it if it would not be used.

Ald. Garratt pointed out that not only one, but three carts, were necessary. The carts were made according to bylaw, and while they were heavy, they were not more so than was required. The tires were five inches wide, as the bylaw states they should be.

The contract for the new cart was recommended to be awarded to Mr. George Heasman for \$360.

The electrical work for the new fire halls was divided. The London Electric Company were awarded the contract for fixtures at \$60 each hall, and the Electrical Construction Company was given the contract for wiring at \$21 each.

Chinese Auction Room.

Inspector McCallum was present and brought up the case of a Chinese man from Toronto, who desired, he stated, to open an auction room for the sale of Chinese and Japanese ware, etc. The inspector had a conference with the man, and had told him that he would have to get an auctioneer's license. It was expected that the Chinaman would be present at the committee meeting but did not show up, and the committee reported that Inspector McCallum had done right in taxing him as a transient trader.

Nothing will be done by the committee regarding the smoke nuisance, City Engineer Graydon reported that his department had no power to deal with the matter, as they were not allowed to interfere with the property of the city.

One was to appeal to the railway companies to use hard coal in the city limits. The other was to pass a bylaw, compelling both railroad companies and manufacturers to use hard coal. This, he pointed out, would be somewhat of a hardship on the industries of the city, and should not be done. The railroad companies said they would soon be compelled to use hard coal, and the citizens could put up with a little inconvenience from the industries.

London Electric's Account.

The agreement with the London Electric Company has not yet been signed, and the bills of the company for December, January and February have not yet been paid. The account last night was laid over pending the signing of the agreement.

Mr. F. B. Keene addressed the committee, and stated that he could give the same bed mattress as the Ontario Bed Mattress Company, for \$10 75, while the committee was paying \$11 for them. The matter will be threshed out in council.

Those present were Ald. Garratt, chairman, Ald. Fitzgerald, Ald. Moorhead, Mayor Stevely, Inspector McCallum, Fire Chief Atken and Secretary Baker.

MAY EXTEND A CALL TO REV. MR. RUTLEDGE

To Succeed Rev. Mr. Laneley as Pastor of Dundas Centre Methodist Church.

The question of choosing a successor to Rev. E. B. Laneley, who leaves for Hamilton at the end of June, will be taken up at a meeting of the quarterly board of Dundas Centre Church to be held on the near future.

Among the names that the board are considering are those of Rev. W. L. Rutledge, of the First Methodist Church; Rev. Thomas Manning, Windsor; Rev. George Campbell, of St. John, N. B.; and Rev. W. F. Wilson, of Toronto. A large portion of the congregation are in favor of Rev. Mr. Rutledge, and it is very likely that a call will be extended to him.

A NEW RULE.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—As a result of the swindling, perpetrated by Christopher Holland now under arrest at Philadelphia, through securing a book of Dominion Express money orders in St. Thomas, a new rule has been put into effect by the express companies. Under this new rule, persons and firms desiring money order books can no longer get these by simply telephoning the express companies first, and then sending messengers for the books, but they must be delivered by the express companies' own messengers.

SPENT SESSION ON STATUTES SUNDAY CARS TO PORT STANLEY

The Legislature Busy Yesterday on Many Revision Measures. The First Request of a Series Was Laid Before Premier Whitney Today.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—Hon. Mr. Foy moves that I do now leave the chair. Carried.

The Speaker steps to the floor of the chamber, the sergeant-at-arms takes the mace from the table, a private member takes the chair beside the clerk, and the House is in committee of the whole on one of the Attorney-general's interminable list of statute revision bills, which make verbal changes in old acts.

"Shall clause one carry?" "Shall clause two carry?" "Carried." And so on until the last clause is reached, and the chairman says: "Your committee report bill No. blank with (or without) certain amendments, and ask leave to sit again."

This formula was repeated with unvarying monotony for nearly three hours at yesterday afternoon's session of the Legislature. The important, and uninteresting to the spectators, and for little value to the press gallery for copy-making purposes.

Juries and Jurors.

The only bill to arouse discussion was that respecting juries and jurors. Hon. Mr. MacKay objected to the provisions of the bill, which provided for the selection of jurors by ballot, and for the payment of a juryman for a day.

Mr. MacKay said that it would be unfair to brand a man as a criminal twenty-five years after he had been convicted of perjury, although he had in the meantime lived an honorable life. A man should be given a chance to live down his offence.

"The abstract," said the Premier, "my honorable friend is right, but it is impossible for us to set up the number of years or the kind of life he may be living. The clause remains unchanged."

Mr. MacKay suggested that fees for grand and petit jurors should be increased from \$2.50 to \$3 per day. Mr. Proudfoot said many counties now voluntarily paid the higher fee.

Mr. McEwing, West Wellington, raised the point that a board of three was sufficient to select jurors. At present the senior and junior judges, the warden, the county treasurer, the sheriff are supposed to act, together with the mayor and the clerk of the city within the county. Mr. McEwing says these officials all appear for roll call, then go away, leaving a fourth, the clerk of the court, to draw \$6 per day for four or five days, so the county rarely gets full value for the money thus paid to jury selectors.

The Premier said that while Mr. McEwing's criticism was well founded, it was the duty of the government, as paymaster, to see that those drawing fees did their work. Therefore no change would be made in the clause.

Mr. MacKay, discussing the bill respecting arbitrations and references, suggested that county judges should receive no fees for arbitrations.

This suggestion met the same fate as his others, the clause being left as it stood.

The following notices of motion were given: Mr. Racine, on Friday next, bill to amend the separate school act; Mr. Brewster, on Friday next, bill to amend the insurance law; Mr. Torrance, on Friday next, bill to amend the assessment act; Mr. Downey, on Friday next, bill to prevent the spread of pulmonary and other forms of tuberculosis; Mr. Craig, on Friday next, bill to amend the provisions of compulsory notification to provincial board of health by physicians and superintendents of institutions, of all cases of tuberculosis. Literature will then be sent, giving instructions for care of patients and prevention of further infection.

ASH WEDNESDAY.

Montreal, Que., Feb. 24.—Ash Wednesday, being a public holiday in the Province of Quebec, all the Government and other public offices, courts, city hall, etc., are closed. Services were held in all the Roman Catholic and Anglican churches, and were fairly well attended, despite a heavy downpour of rain. Montreal is having an unusually long period of mild weather with considerable rain for this season of the year.
