C. P. R. IS NOT BEING HELD UP IN EAST END

Looks as Though McCarty Property Will Be Secured by the Company.

A rumor to the effect that the C. P. R. improvements were held up owing to the failure of the company to obtain the McCarty property on Elias street does not appear to be founded on fact.

The McCarty property, comprising an acre of land, is located in the district where the company made considerable purchases of land, and while desirable, it is not essential to the scheme of improvements.

An agreement as to the price could not be reached, and Mr. McCarty, who lives in Columbus, Ohio, and his sister, of Chicago, in whose name the property is now deeded, came to the city to make an arrangement as to the cost.

The matter has not been taken up by the C. P. R. yet, but they will get together today.

"I do not think there will be a great deal of difficulty in arranging matters," said Mr. Arthur E. Houd, who is in charge of the negotiations. "I have been away for a few days, and have not had time to look into the matter closely as yet, but we will do so immediately. I do not anticipate any trouble, for I think the improvements will be held up."

QUOTERS' MEETING WILL BE HELD ON WEDNESDAY

When Entry Must Be Made for Summer Matches—If You Cannot Be There Mail Your Card.

Owing to the rainstorm on Saturday the quotters were unable to meet at the grounds on Horton street, as intended, to make arrangements for the summer contests.

The meeting will be held instead at 6 o'clock Wednesday evening at the grounds on Horton street, opposite the Traction station, when all those desiring to play must make their entry. Games will be played each Saturday till the end of August, and matches will commence on Saturday next.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Review of Its Recent Gathering at Halifax—Great Meetings—Model Moderator.

Halifax, June 9.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which passed into history tonight, is admitted on all hands to have been the greatest since the union of the church in 1875. The moderator, Dr. Chas. Forest, principal of Dalhousie University, has proved himself a model moderator in every sense.

Though the principal does not pose as a church lawyer, his firmness, kindness, genial humor and sound common sense have enabled him to keep perfect order, and to pilot the house safely through some stormy waters. There has been no better moderator in the past history of the assembly. Great satisfaction has been expressed by the people of Halifax at the honor conferred on one of the most distinguished churchmen and educationists of the Maritime Provinces.

The two great meetings of the assembly were the home and foreign mission night and the large assembly church was crowded to the doors, and so thrilling were the addresses of the missionaries that the whole audience remained until nearly 1 o'clock.

The greatest service of the church at this hour, especially in connection with home missions, is ministers and missionaries. Dr. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor), stated that unless more could be secured it looked as if 750 preaching stations in the great west would be without any service next winter. The church during the past year has raised no less than \$250,000 for missionary, educational and benevolent purposes. For all purposes the magnificent sum of \$4,000,000 was raised.

There were two great debates in the assembly: That on the relation of Queen's University to the church, and that on church union. It is no exaggeration to say that it was well worth while to travel all the way from London to Halifax to hear. The result in each case has already been given to your readers.

Rev. J. G. Inkster's Address.
On the Queen's question a very able speech was made by Rev. J. G. Inkster, of London, which was well received by the assembly.

"I speak against the separation of Queen's from the church," said Mr. Inkster. "With a great deal of diffidence, because of the regard I have for the opinion of those who are advocating it. Still in justice to myself and to the great church of which I am a member and of which Queen's University is a part, I must oppose the recommendation of the committee."

My chief reason for opposing the separation is because we are not told what is to become of Queen's when she is separated. How is she to be provided for? They have not chosen, and I think we have a right to know. We have a moral responsibility to this daughter of the church which we have nurtured into existence and nurtured all these years. Further, I do not believe it is fair to all the benefactors of Queen's, some of whom are alive and most of whom are dead, to hand over their benefactions to any state-aided institution.

"There are hundreds of Queen's graduates who through difference to the faculty are seeking for separation, and the commission who is recommending it are tacitly in favor of separation; but in their hearts they are silently anxious to see their beloved alma mater retain its connection with the Presbyterian Church of Canada."

"I was thrilled with enthusiasm at the day when I read that a denominational union was being suggested. States refused Rockefeller's money on the condition that she give up her denominational connection. I am hoping that the faculty will be as wise as Presbyterians, will refuse any grant of money which imposes any similar conditions on Queen's University."

Other London Men.
Rev. Dr. D. L. McCrae made capital speeches on the aged and infirm ministers' fund, and on the hymn committee's work in moving that the general assembly adopt the reports on these subjects.

Among those present from the London Presbytery were E. L. Pidgeon, St. Thomas; Dr. McCrae, J. G. Inkster, J. Lindsay, Geo. Weir, John Currie, W. H. Geddes. The elders present were N. McAlpine, Ekfrid; J. A. McLachlan, Komoka; David Forbes, St. Thomas; J. Langford, Maple Grove; E. Charlton, Ilkerton; G. K. Whitton, Rodney, and Jas. F. Dyer, London. All the delegates are taking a lively part in the proceedings.

Most Successful Convention.
Altogether the assembly has been

the most successful and delightful one. The people of Halifax have thrown open their homes, and their hearts to all the visiting ministers and elders. It is interesting to note that His Honor D. C. Fraser, the lieutenant-governor of Nova Scotia has been one of the most active elders in the assembly. His speech on union was one of the best heard during the debate.

There were about 400 commissioners present representing every part of the Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The roads in the outlying districts of London are a disgrace to the city. After a day's rain the streets in South London are mud halfway up to the hubs. An auto agent was canvassing me the other day. I told him that I had made a gift of an auto I could not use in my work on our back streets.

There must be something wrong in our methods of street construction and repairing. Cement sidewalks galore are laid where in bad weather the roadway is almost impassable. I am not a reckless driver by any means, but outside of mid-summer, there is scarcely a month in which I do not have a broken spring or other accident to my vehicles. I am obliged to walk at least one-fourth of the time on account of the state of the streets while my horse stands idle in the stable. No attempt seems to be made to regularly fill holes and ruts as they appear. A coat of gravel is spread on the road, and no further attention is paid to it until the gravel disappears, and then, perhaps, a fresh coat is dumped down again. Stones of all sizes are left to ruin horses' feet and limbs.

I am reluctant to appear in print as a complainant, but I have been driving on our streets now for twenty years, and as far as South London is concerned I know the roads are not one whit better now than they were twenty years ago. Is it not time to agitate for some improvement in this department of our civic administration? Yours truly, R. FERGUSON.

\$400 A MONTH SAVING AT SPRINGBANK STATION

According to Engineer Glaubitz, Change to Electricity Will Mean Quite an Item.

The report of Engineer Glaubitz on the Springbank pumping station is ready, and it will show that the city will save nearly \$400 a month by using Niagara power at the station rather than coal and hydraulic power.

The cost of installing electricity will be little more than the improvements necessary to bring the plant up to a state of efficiency. The hydraulic pumps are in bad shape, and will shortly have to be replaced. In order to give them more power it would be necessary to expend a large sum of money to enlarge the flume, and also it would be necessary to increase the flow. This would mean more water, and a consequent backing up on the Saunby property and more trouble and much more expense.

A Big Saving.
Taking into consideration the cost of installing machinery, and the cost of operation, etc., the savings suggested by Engineer Glaubitz will mean a saving of \$400 a month, and a much greater efficiency than at the present time.

The water commissioners will discuss the report at a meeting to be held on Tuesday, and it is more than likely that they will decide on the changes suggested by the consulting engineer.

It is more than probable it is said at the city hall that the last has been heard of the Saunby matter so far as the city proper is concerned.

Not Needed for Power.
While it would be of much advantage to have boating further up the river, but the cost is considered excessive, and since it is not needed to give power to the dam, the purchase will not be recommended.

Dredging the river will give a deep channel and furnish boating facilities for some time to come.

FIELD CROP FIGURES FOR THE DOMINION

Area Under Fall Wheat Is Put Down at Over Seven Hundred Thousand Acres.

Ottawa, June 10.—The census and statistics office has today issued a report on the estimated area and condition of the principal field crops of Canada at the end of May, based on the reports of a large staff of correspondents.

The area under fall wheat is put down at 707,200 acres, which is 45,100 acres more than last year, and its per cent of a standard condition is given as 87.65, which is 5.50 higher than last year. Spring wheat is given an area of 587,600 acres, being 1,499,300 acres more than last year, and its condition is compared with the end of May last year is 91.49 to 92.15. Oats, which has an area of 9,864,100 acres, is 561,500 acres more than last year, and its condition at the end of May was 93.95, a year ago its condition was 92.32. The area of barley is 1,834,000 acres, or 30,500 acres less than last year.
