

The area under fall wheat is put down at 707,200 acres, which is 45,100 acres more than last year, and its per cent of a standard condition is given as 87.65, which is 5.50 higher than last Grape-Nuts and chew them year. Spring wheat is given an area of 8.587,600 acres, being 1.499,300 acres more than last year, and its condition as compared with the end of May last year is 91.49 to 92.15. Oats, which has an area of 9.864,100 acres, is 561,-500 acres more than last year, and its dition at the end of May was 93.95.
