BIG SUPPLY OF DRESSED HOGS

Farmers are Taking Advantage of High Prices On Local Market.

HAY AND OATS STRONG

Offerings Were Large, But Demand Was Brisk—The Quotations Today.

There was an unusually large amount of hay and oats on the market this morning, and the demand was very brisk. In all there were about 30 loads of hay on the square, and the price ranged from \$11 to \$12 per ton. It is likely that before long hay will grow dearer. The good roads are also an incentive to the farmers to come to the market, and if the fine weather continues the markets all this week should be large.

Dressed hogs were very much in evidence. The present price is rather high, and the farmers are taking advantage of it. This morning's price was from \$10 to \$11 per cwt. and there was a good demand at these prices.

Vegetables were a little scarce, with the exception of potatoes. There were several loads of these this morning, but the prices are unchanged.

Oats are getting cheaper, and the price now is \$11 to \$12 per cwt. There were 20 loads on the market this morning, and the demand was very brisk. All the loads were sold before 10 o'clock.

Saturday's prices prevail in butter, eggs and poultry, and it is probable there will be no change this week.
