WAS WRECK NEWS KEPT FROM PUBLIC

Evidence Before Investigators That It Was Suppressed Many Hours.

THE PROBE ADJOURNED

All Witnesses Permitted to Leave Washington and Inquiry Practically Ends.

Washington, April 30.—In deference to the wishes of his colleagues on the Senate sub-committee investigating the circumstances of the Titanic disaster, William Alden Smith tonight announced the adjournment of the hearings until 9 o'clock Friday morning. The senator said, following adjournment, that he would take advantage of the recess and go to New York tomorrow morning to investigate the statement made before the committee today that the White Star Line had authoritative news of the sinking of the Titanic by 8 o'clock Monday morning, nearly 12 hours before they announced the loss of the liner. Edward J. Dunn, a wall-paper importer of Beechhurst, Long Island, testified that he had information that such a message was handled by the Western Union Telegraph Company early Monday morning. Dunn refused to divulge the name of his informant, saying that to do so would deprive an operator from which this information came of his job. He was kept in custody by a sergeant-at-arms of the Senate until late in the afternoon, but persisted in his refusal to give up the name of his informant. He is still under restraint.

With today's proceedings the Senate finished with all the British witnesses who have been held here, including J. Bruce Ismay, president of the International Mercantile Marine Company, Mr. Ismay and all his associates left the city this afternoon. It is generally accepted here tonight that the investigation practically is at an end. The committee may proceed to New York in a few days to clear up a few minor questions.

More lifeboats on trans-Atlantic liners, an equipment of rafts that automatically would float clear of a sinking vessel, and the construction of great passenger steamers with double hulls and extended watertight compartments—all these reforms, it was indicated, would follow in the immediate future.

EVIDENCE UNCERTAIN CHARGE DISMISSED

Ingersoll Men Claimed They Were Having a Joke On Police.

Ingersoll, May 1.—The second attempt to establish the fact that gambling has been going on in the town resulted in failure in the police court yesterday afternoon. The defendant in the case was C. B. Ryan, who was charged with keeping a common gaming house, to which he pleaded not guilty. The charge was laid in consequence of the raid made by the police at an early hour last Saturday morning. The evidence of Ryan and the others who were in the room was to the effect that there was no cards, that there was no playing whatever, and that the doors were not locked. They further stated that they had learned that the officers were going to pull off a raid, and they went to the room in question simply to have a joke on the police. The police told of finding doors locked, of the lights being turned out, and of the scramble on the part of those in the room at the table at which they were seated. Constable Beers was positive he saw cards on the tables. The witnesses told a consistent story that they were simply chatting in the room, and the magistrate dismissed the case. The case against the frequenters were adjourned. Mr. S. G. MacKay, Woodstock, defended, and County Crown Attorney R. N. Hall prosecuted.
