URGE FARMERS TO PULL TOGETHER

Experts Advise Co-operation and Develop Selfish Policy—Too Much Politics.

Stratford, Jan. 24.—At a meeting of the agricultural societies of Huron, Perth, Middlesex and Elgin here this afternoon, J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent of agricultural fairs for Ontario, and T. A. Race, of Mitchell, urged the importance of farmers pulling together.

They were urged not to try to grow 100 or more varieties of oats or any other grain in a district, but to ascertain just what kind of grain the land in the locality is suited for and then grow it.

Co-operation was also urged, and it was pointed out that too many farmers are either working entirely for themselves or against one another. This is especially true politically and, as a result, little is being accomplished; whereas, if all farmers pulled together they could secure much that would advance their mutual welfare.

The importance of dealing with absolute honesty in everything if trade is to be secured and held, was also dwelt upon.

W. A. McKenzie of Mitchell, in his opening address, told of the fine progress being made by all the societies.

High Cost of Living.

The financial statement showed a condition of prosperity. T. A. Race, of Mitchell, gave some excellent reasons why the high cost of living has grown to disturbing proportions.

"I don't think the farmer is getting any too much for what he produces," he said. "But while the manufacturers have joined hands to strengthen their position, and while the workmen are shoulder to shoulder fighting for what is justly theirs, the farmers have made nothing but individual efforts."

"Some wrong views of things also have been taken. While agriculture is the basis of all national prosperity we must not lose sight of the fact that no nation has ever grown to greatness through it alone."

J. Lockie Wilson pressed home the need for more specialization in growing of grain. "What we are trying to do is to have each district grow that variety of grain or vegetable for which it is adapted."

More co-operation in the producing and selling of farm products were also advised.

Speaking of field crop competitions, he said they had done more for agriculture in Ontario than anything yet done.

A motion that goods which are given as prizes by the businessman be put in the account at 50 per cent, and J. A. McKenzie, of Mitchell, and E. Christie, of Exeter, were selected to be recommended as president and vice-president at the association meeting in Toronto. Mr. Wheaton, of Thorncliffe, was elected secretary-treasurer unanimously.

The next annual meeting will be held in Stratford.

Many Attended.

CHILD DIES FROM BURNS.

Toronto, Jan. 25.—Emily Ross, three years old, whose parents reside at No. 4 Chandos street, died today in the Children's Hospital from burns she received while playing with matches on Saturday.

EX-CONGRESSMAN TRIED TO BUY WAY TO BENCH

Former Democratic Leader Was Indicted With Him.

New York, Jan. 26.—Wm. Willett, jun., former member of Congress, was convicted Saturday night of bribery in attempting to purchase a supreme court nomination in Brooklyn and Queens County in 1911. The jury had the case under consideration for forty minutes.

Willett was remanded to jail for sentence next Friday.

Indicted with Willett were Joseph Cassidy, former Democratic leader of Queens County, and once an important figure in local politics, and Louis T. Walter, jun., as the go-between.

TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF LORD STRATHCONA

Prominent Men Join in Mass Meeting
Held at Toronto.

Toronto, Jan. 25.—The Province of Ontario and the city of Toronto paid tribute to the memory of the late Lord Strathcona this afternoon at Massey Hall, where men prominent in civil, political, and military life gathered. Several hundred Strathcona Cadets from the Toronto public schools occupied seats in the upper part of the platform.

Words of tribute were uttered by Rev. Dr. John Neil and Right Rev. Bishop W. D. Reeve, who delivered the only addresses at the service. Dr. Neil attributed his success in large measure to his tremendous faith, not only in himself, but also in the future of Canada.

Bishop Reeve, through his long residence in the Canadian north land, had had a more or less intimate acquaintance with the late Lord Strathcona. Knowing him personally, Bishop Reeve spoke with authority of his generous liberality and his many charities.

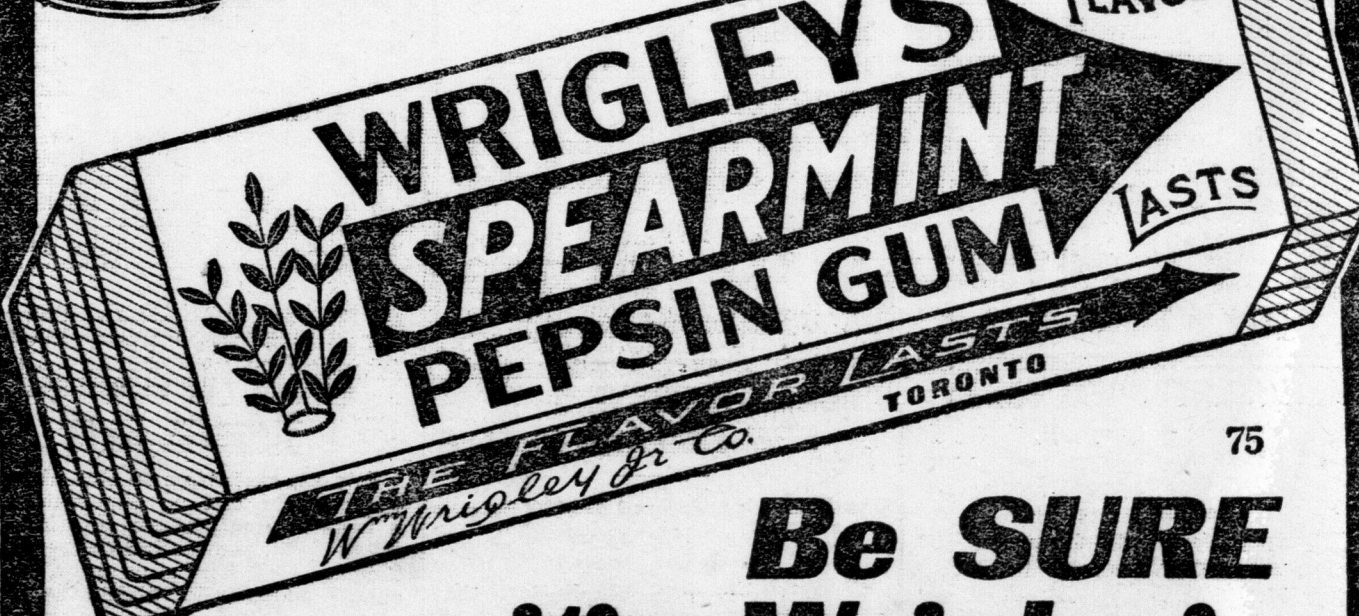
