> Milan, Italy, April 9. — The dirgible balloon Citta di Milano, which was built by public subscription and presented to the army, was entirely destroyed today. The dirgible landed outside of Milan, owing to damage to her motor. Almost immediately a crowd gathered, notwithstanding the warnings of the officers aboard, someone imprudently lighted a cigar. A tremendous explosion resulted, and fifty persons suffered in-juries of various kinds, two of them being dangerously wounded. FUTILE FOR CANADA TO TRY AND BAR CHINESE

Vancouver, B. C., April 9. - British Columbia Presbyterian clergymen gathered at their annual synod here today, were startled at a new view of the Oriental question introduced by Rev. Duncan Mc-Formosa. China, he said, was a mighty nation, pulsing with life and ambitions, and for Canada to say she would keep the Chinese out, was futile. They might as well raise their hands, and beat back the winds of the air, as to expect to beat back an awakened China.


"You people here," he said, "stiffling in your little mountains, have no idea of the tremendous forces that have been awakened in China.

Toronto, April 9. — Further supplementary estimates to the sum of \$6,-74,027 were submitted for the consideration of the Legislature this afternoon by the Hon. I. B. Lucas, thus bringing the full estimates for the amount of money to be expended by the Province of Onario for the year 1914 up to the sum of \$17,437,738. Against this, the Provincial Secretary has already presented a statement of estimated receipts for the fiscal year ending the same date at \$12,174,074, which leaves something like five and a quarter millions yet to be dug up by the treasury department if the financial account is to make both ends meet.

Grant to Hydro. The individual large item which swells these supplementary estimates above all previous figures is a straight \$5,000,000 grant to the Provincial Hydro-Electric Power Commission for the extension of the lines and the carrying on of the proposed electrical radial schemes. Salaries and other remuneration in connection with the Public Roads and Highways Commission are to be paid \$75,000. The allowance to Sir William Meredith re workmen's compensation, at \$7,500, The University of Toronto gets an added grant of \$80,000, while Queen's and the Western

Universities each get \$10,000. Colonization roads will be helped to the ern division gets \$162,078, the western secis granted \$132,094, while the Temiskaming section benefits to the extent of \$72,658.

Public Works. The public works department will cost an extra \$152,106 above the original estimates, a large percentage of this being due to grainage grants and bridges. The new Government House comes prominently on the list for a further expenditure of \$125,000, while the whole maintenance and repairs branch of the government buildings is listed for \$227,398. On this list is a \$60,000 item for a courthouse and jail at the Soo and a \$10,000 registry office at Fort William. The outside of the parliament buildings will be reburnished to the cost of \$1,000. Colonization and immigra-

Grants to Agriculture. The department of agriculture will be benefited to the extent of \$6,055, a large percentage of this being grants to agriulture and horticultural societies. Public institutions and their maintenance have been increased by \$29,750, the most of these accounts being made up by provisions, with a few slight increases in salaries. The department of education is benefited to the extent of \$7,961, all in the provision of salary for a naturalist in


