LONDONER URGES IMPORTANCE OF NATIONAL IDEALS

Dean Tucker Discusses Problems At Huron Deanery Meeting.

(Special To The Advertiser.)

BLITH, June 1.—Dean Tucker of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, gave a splendid address here tonight at the evening session of the annual meeting of the deanery of Huron on "National Life Ideals." He made a strong plea for the maintenance of all that makes for the best in home and national life, and the exclusion of the forces which break down instead of building up. At no period in the world's history, he pointed out, has there been such an urgent need of co-operation in the fight for the right, and he urged young people especially to make the right choice and spread their influence.

The annual session opened in Trinity Church this morning, with a special service, in charge of Rev. Walter Hawkins, assisted by Rev. D. McKenna of Clinton. During the service the Deanery Women's Auxiliaries met with the president, Mrs. (Rev.) Brown of Seneca, in the chair, and discussed mission work at some length. Mrs. Brown was re-elected as president, and Miss E. Johnston of Hensall was elected as secretary. Reports which were presented showed a busy and aggressive year's work.

At a meeting this afternoon Rural Dean Snell of Wingham presided, and Rev. J. S. Patterson of Toronto gave an address on "The Aims of the Sunday School." He discussed the problem of why so many quit Sunday school at such an early age, and emphasized the importance of getting pupils interested in missions, and of giving them plenty to do. In a general discussion which followed those taking part were Rev. S. D. McKenna of Clinton, Rev. S. S. Hardy of Goderich, and Rev. C. C. Betts.

The next meeting will be held at Fordwich.

London Rotarians Thrilled By Gigantic Undertaking of the Chippewa Hydro Power Scheme

Greatest Public Utility Engineering Work Ever Attempted in World's History, Conceived and Carried Out by Young Canadians—Will Be Completed by September 1, 1921.

NIAGARA FALLS, June 1.—History has many great engineering works on record the remains of a number of them still standing as monuments of past greatness, while of others, but for the stories told of them nothing remains. Among these remarkable examples of man's handiwork and the conquest of difficulties may be mentioned The Tower of Babel, the Pyramids, the Great Wall of China, the Corinthian Canal, the aqueduct that supplied water to the City of Rome during the days of the empire's greatness, and coming to modern times the Aswan Dam on the River Nile in Egypt, the Panama Canal, etc., but it is doubtful if any of these great efforts of human ingenuity benefited humanity to the even proportional extent that the Chippewa-Queenston hydro power scheme which is fast nearing completion will do.

It was therefore particularly fitting that the London Rotarians bearing in mind the slogan and purpose of their organization "the service of mankind," should accept the invitation of Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro Electric Power Commission, to make a visit to the scene of this great undertaking the occasion of their first meeting, and to see that not one of the 135 Rotarians and their friends who left their coats an hour earlier than usual this morning in order to catch the special G. T. R. train which left London at 7:30 o'clock regretted doing so. It was giving faint expression to the general pleasure and satisfaction which the trip gave to everybody.

Work of Canadians. Much has been written of this work, conceived, planned and being carried out by young Canadians. Numerous writers have designated the scheme itself and the work entailed in its fulfilment as "stupendous," "enormous," etc., but when a visit is made to the site and the actual work of construction witnessed even the least versed in the understanding of the meaning of words realizes how very inadequately either of these words describes what is taking place in the twelve and one-half miles between Chippewa and Queenston.

Immediately on arrival of the visiting Rotarians, Sir Adam Beck and Chief Hydraulic Engineer Harry Acres, took charge of the party, and under their direction a visit was made to the generating plant of the Ontario Power Company's plant in the acquisition of which the City of London is interested to the extent of \$4,000,000, which amount Sir Adam in a brief speech later stated would in the outside period of 20 to 25 years be returned to the city.

A tour was made through the power house, special interest being shown in the huge turbines and dynamos, while the size of the actual work of construction was explained by accompanying hydro officials. After the visit to this point the visitors were the guests of Sir Adam Beck at lunch at the Refectory. In a brief address after lunch, Sir Adam explained the principle features of the Chippewa scheme, explaining that the noise consequent on the work going on would make it impossible to do so to such a large party at the scene.

Described Plant. His description of the plant and the amount of additional power which it is expected to provide when completed was along the lines already published at length from speeches made by Sir Adam, and from debates in the Legislature. He paid a very warm tribute to the ability of the engineers in charge of the work, and Chief Engineer Acres, through all the various phases of the undertaking, and expressed a fear that the people of Ontario fail to realize that this great work is the result of the initiative and engineering ability of young Canadians. "In no phase of the work, and at no time since its inception," declared Sir Adam, "have we been forced to call in or even ask for any foreign assistance."

While Sir Adam very confidently asserted and stated that he had the authority of his engineers for doing so, that three units of the ten which will comprise the vast power-producing plant, will be ready for operation by September 1, the majority of the party, after seeing the work underway and the great amount of work yet to be accomplished, joined the ranks of doubting Thomases, but there was not one but sincerely hoped that all connected with the work may see their hopes realized. That the hopes and determination to make the hope a fact has penetrated from the chairman of the commission down to the youngest employee on the payroll was evident in brief conversations that The Advertiser reporter had with some of the workers.

Completion Date, Sept. 1. "September the First" has become a slogan, and it will not be the fault of any workman on the job if the aim set is not accomplished, but in an undertaking of this size of the one in hand, mere human skill and patience are often called upon to face unexpected displays of the powers of nature.

The trip to the site of the great power house, the size of which when completed it set in front of the falls completely hide them from sight, was made on a work train, the train for which runs parallel with the river from Niagara Falls to the base of the falls at Chippewa. Here the visitors saw the great cement-steel structure which is to house the ten power generating units under construction. The size of the work, the number of workmen employed and the great cliff from which space to place the building has been hewn, gave a feeling almost akin to awe.

To give a detailed description of the scene or the work in hand, after a visit in which less than 10 or at the most 15 minutes could be given to the scene, was impossible. To gather even a fair idea of the task in hand, the uninitiated onlooker would need at least a week for the features of the work are not located in one spot, but are spread over the whole 12½ miles between the intake at Chippewa and the outlet at Queenston.

Inspection of Inlets. From the power house at the foot of the cliff the party were taken to the top where an inspection of the inlets of the great 16 feet, 1-18 inch, pipes which will form the penstock down which the water which will operate the great turbines will fall a distance of 305 feet was made, followed by a trip down into the interior of the forebay, where the novel sight of seeing cement concrete applied to the face of the rock from a nozzle, known amongst the workers as a gun, at a pressure of 50 pounds, was witnessed. A feature of the inspection of this part of the work was that considerable

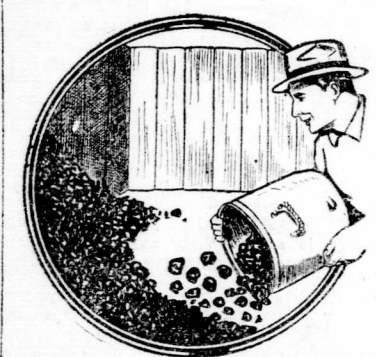

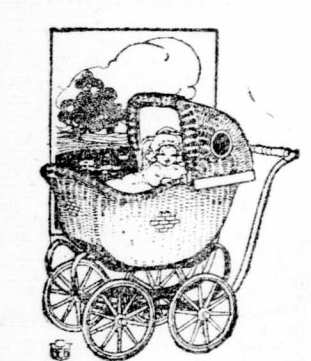

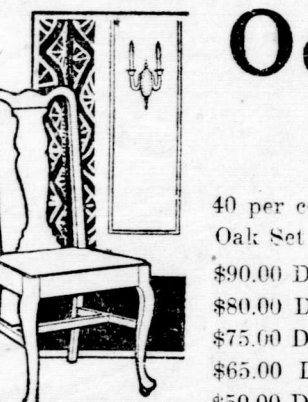
