

BAPTISTS OPEN CONVENTION

New Pastors Are Introduced At Regular Meeting At Sarnia.

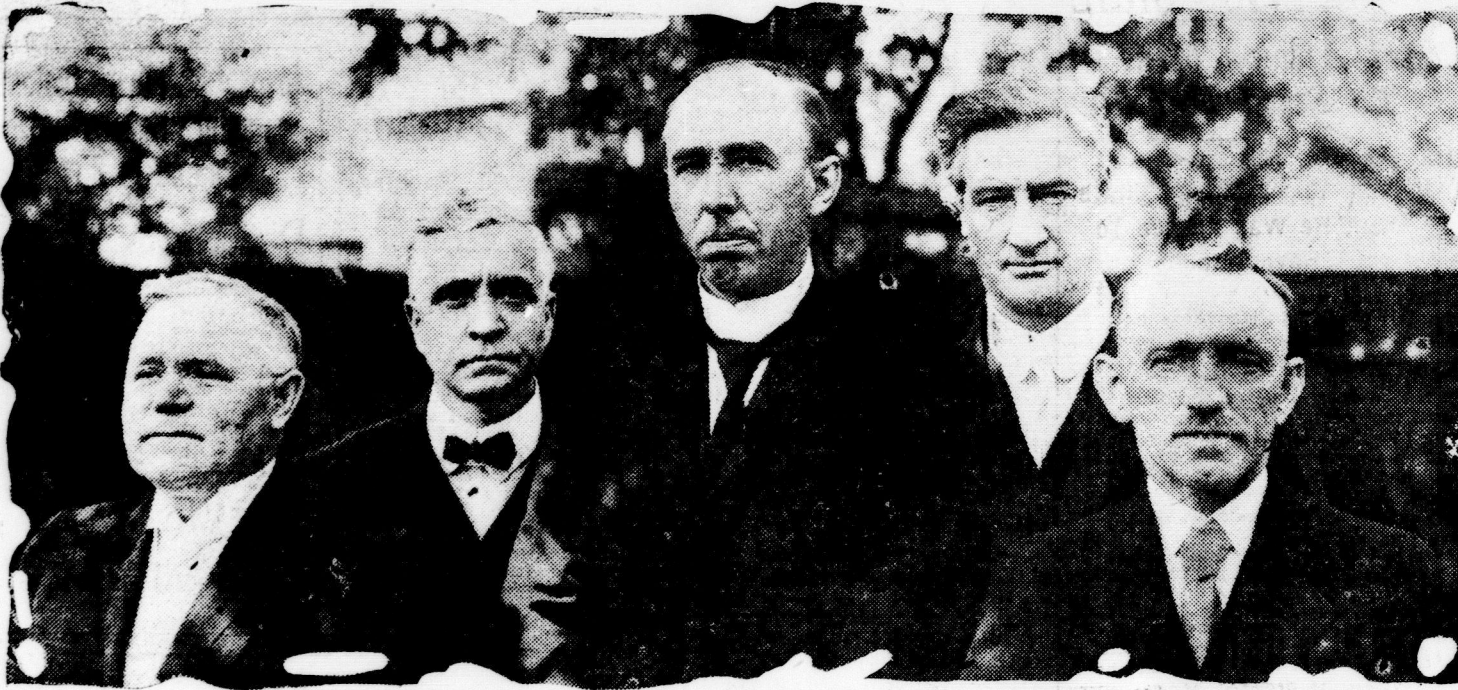
Rev. G. A. Leichter Delivers Address On Evangelism.

SARNIA, June 1.—The regular sessions of the Association of Baptist Churches of Middlesex and Lambton opened at the Baptist Church, Sarnia, this morning, with more than 100 delegates present. The moderator, Rev. R. F. McKay, gave the opening address on "Christian Fellowship," after which the following new pastors were introduced: Rev. Dr. Green of London, Rev. A. B. Vincent of Strathroy, Rev. J. E. Pettit of Oil Springs, and Mr. E. Stone of Wyoming. Annual letters from churches were read by the Rev. T. Doolittle, M.A. Rev. A. H. Jones of Arkona preached the annual sermon. Report of committee on the state of religion showed 22 churches in the association, 200 additional members by baptism, and a net increase in membership of 56. There was \$86,000 raised for home purposes, and \$22,000 for missions. Six ministers left the association in the year, and seven new members were received. Dr. E. M. Keirstad of Toronto corrected a report in the press that Dr. John McNeill of Toronto would succeed Dr. McCrimmon as chancellor of McMaster University, saying that when the appointment was made it would be made known through the regular channels. The Rev. G. A. Leichter, R.D., M.A., of London gave an address on "Evangelism." Session continued until Friday night.

A letter conveying the text of the congratulatory resolution passed by the city council in connection with the accomplishments of the Sarnia Collegiate athletes at London inter-collegiate track meet has been forwarded to the Collegiate by the city clerk. The resolution, proposed by Ald. George Richards, and seconded by Ald. T. H. Cook, extended congratulations to the youths "for their great achievements," and was drafted "just to show that we appreciate good sportsmanship."

With the arrival of the steamer Emperor this morning from Lake Superior ports with a cargo of 230 cars of iron ore the ore season of 1922 has now commenced, and from now on two shipments weekly will be received through this port. Two special trains left for Hamilton tonight with the ore, and the Emperor will clear tomorrow for another cargo. The steamer Westmont will arrive on Monday with 220 cars of ore, and will be released on the following day. With the ore season in full swing an important impetus will be given to the local Grand Trunk business, probably amounting to a dozen trains a week. The Huzenar arrived from the west today with 60 carloads of four and forty passengers.

Will Prune Salaries of Brantford Officials.

Special to London Advertiser. BRANTFORD, June 1.—The axe is to fall on the civic employees who are getting a salary of \$1,200 or over, it was announced at the city hall here today by one of the aldermen.

The "pruning committee," as it has come to be called, met yesterday and the question of civic wage and salary reductions was again to the fore. A 10 per cent reduction in the cases of most of those city hall officials now drawing over \$1,200 was discussed, though nothing definite was decided upon.

Raid Two Houses and Secure Large Quantity of "Moonshine."

Special to London Advertiser. WINDSOR, June 1.—One of the most complete stills yet taken along the border was seized tonight by the Sandwich police, who raided two houses suspected of being illicit distilleries.

Expects Ontario To Expend Nearly 24 Millions In Coming Fiscal Year

TORONTO, June 1.—During the coming fiscal year, ending October 31, 1923, Ontario is due to spend \$23,756,675, according to the estimates brought down today by Provincial Treasurer Peter Smith.

A summary of the estimates reveals the following main items: Civil government, \$1,974,250; legislation, \$330,410; administration of justice, \$1,770,315; education, \$6,652,232; public institutions, \$3,657,538; agriculture, \$1,529,340; colonization

and immigration, \$1,132,950; hospitals and charities, \$1,212,950; maintenance and repairs of government buildings, \$501,284; public buildings, \$758,450; public works, \$161,500; department of labor, \$2,075,515; colonization roads, \$107,300; department of public highways, \$181,120; game and fisheries, \$216,600.

Capital expenditure account of the hydro-electric power commission, which is not included in the above total, is \$6,379,000.

More than 30 gallons of "moonshine" was also taken by the police.

Three bottles of imported whiskey, a ten-gallon keg of Canadian liquor and two quarts of home distilled liquor were found at the home of William Dulick, Queen street, who was arrested and charged with keeping liquor for sale.

Breaking into a house occupied by Oscar Tycolitz, the police discovered a twenty-gallon still and several gallons of raisin liquor. Tycolitz was not at home, and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

CUSTOMS TOTALS FALL IN KITCHENER. Special to London Advertiser. KITCHENER, June 1.—Customs

returns for the month of May in Kitchener took a decided drop. The decrease was over \$100,000 compared with the same month a year ago.

This is attributed to the smaller shipments of liquor from Kitchener. The total for the month was \$186,546.36.
